# PROFILE ON JANET DUGGAN

Senior Vice Principal Janet Duggan has brought even more skills to our Academy by becoming an Ofsted Additional Inspector. She took time out of her busy schedule to tell us about her new role.

Our Academy can now boast that it has an Ofsted Additional Inspector amongst its ranks.

For the past two years Senior Vice Principal Janet Duggan has undergone the strenuous training programme run by SERCO for all candidates who want to become additional inspectors.

Mrs Duggan recently completed her final challenge of being part of an inspection team at a primary school and after passing with flying colours she is now an official Ofsted Additional Inspector.

She said: "The process has been rigorous and illuminating and it shows you the other side. I have learned Ofsted want to give schools every opportunity to show what they are doing to make a difference to the learning of children and the lives of children. The inspectors are always looking for cause and effect. For example, the teacher does X and the impact on learning is Y.

"During training you are made aware of the all factors you need to take into account when deciding that the progress made over time by students is either outstanding, good, requiring improvement or inadequate."

Even before Mrs Duggan qualified as an inspector she found the experience was paying dividends for our Academy and other schools across the Brooke Weston Trust, which funded her training.

She said: "I have shared my experiences with several schools in the Trust, I've led sessions for teachers on the new Ofsted Frameworks which contain the evaluation schedule by which schools are judged. "This, in turn, identified some teaching and learning issues with some schools and we were able to help them with that. I have also supported middle leaders in one of the Trust's schools.

"Going through Ofsted training definitely sharpens your focus within your own school. In the past year or so we have done a lot of work scrutinies. For example we've questioned whether innovative, creative teaching strategies are being used. We've examined whether students have the opportunity to reflect on their own progress and set their own personal targets. We've looked at whether teachers are marking formatively and whether students have been given enough time to act on the written feedback.

"It sharpens your focus on the progress being made by different groups of students in the school."

One of the reasons Mrs Duggan was able to qualify for the training process was because she is a practising teacher at a school which is rated Good by Ofsted.

She said: "The lovely thing about the training is the quality of people that you meet. Most of them were headteachers but there were also deputy headteachers and teachers who were all from good schools.

"It's a great opportunity to share best practice and exchange ideas with people who are at the top of their game and then bring those ideas here."

In the future Mrs Duggan hopes to do further training to do with the inspection of Unit Provision and Special Schools.

Year 10 students Sonny Dalziel, Ethan Mathieson and Kearnu Stapleton joined the Brooke Weston Trust Combined Cadet Force (Army Section) unit when it launched in September.



Ethan has qualified as a marksman and all three students took part in a field trip during which they explored woodland, created safe areas, performed snap ambushes, erected a bivvy shelter and shot a No. 8 rifle.

Kearnu, who is also an Air Cadet, said: "I would like to have a military career so this is a really good experience for me."

Ethan said: "I'm in the ATC and I wanted to try the Army cadets so I could learn about a different side of the military. It teaches you team building skills and how to identify people's strengths."

Sonny has also benefited from learning team building skills with the cadets.

He said: "It's important that you learn to identify people's strengths because a team is only as good as its weakest link."

During its first year, the Trust's Combined Cadet Force is working in partnership with cadets from the Oundle School and 49 Brigade.

The Trust's force will then apply to the Ministry of Defence for permission to go solo.

Director of Active Amy Harris said: "Richard gave us a motivational talk from his vast experiences within a fitness context to our Key Stage 4 students during assembly.

"Afterwards our BTEC Sport and GCSE PE students had the chance to ask him questions about his experiences and challenges and about methods of training, diet and exercise.

"Our Year 12 BTEC Sport students said the opportunity to meet him was fantastic. His knowledge is incredible and he has experienced so many sides of the fitness industry from participating as a 100m sprinter when he was young to being a personal fitness instructor for celebrities such as Made in Chelsea's Lucy Watson and Geordie Shore's Charlotte Crosby. He is also now developing his own brand of training called 'Armageddon'.

'The information he gave the BTEC students will be particularly helpful for their next two units – Fitness Testing and The Physiology of Fitness."

During the assembly Mr Callender emphasised to students the importance of hard work and a 'can do' attitude.

Mr Callender said: "I found it a pleasure to talk to the students at CBA.'

"We also had the chance to sketch pieces or take photographs of some of the paintings we were interested in so we could find out more about them."

# **ARTISTS TAKE LIFE DRAWING CLASSES**

A group of older students has taken part in our first ever life drawing classes during Session 4.

About 15 students from Years 11, 12 and 13 attended the classes this term which were led by guest Life Drawing Tutor Sally Locke.

CBA Director of Art Zoe Moore said: "The classes helped the students to improve their observational study skills and gave them experience of working in a workshop environment. 'This is important because they need to show they have experienced working with other artists and using practices they wouldn't normally use in the classroom.

"The classes also gave them training in perspective, proportion, line and form.

'It has really helped our Year 12 students make the transition from GCSE to A-Level.

"It also gave our Year 13 students the chance to concentrate on their areas of personal study and to explore using new media."

Year 13 student Sally O'Keeffe said: "I found the first session a bit strange but I soon got used to it.

"After a short while you don't really look at the model as a person – they are more like an object or a collection of lines.

The sessions were really useful and have helped me to discover my own style of drawing."

# SWIMMERS AND DIVER TRIUMPH AT COMPETITIONS

Several of our students have triumphed at swimming and diving competitions.

Diver Warren Hackley began the year by winning Bronze at the 2014 Harrogate Hydro Novices in September. His performance also helped his team, Corby Steel Diving Club, to come second.

In October, the Year 8 student competed at the White Rose in Leeds which is the UK's biggest novice club competition.

Warren scored a personal best of 307.5 points and was second in the preliminary round, claiming a final's place and medal. He finished fourth in his group final and with fewer than three points between the top four positions it was his closest brush with Gold yet.

Swimmer William Roberts also started the year well when he won two Golds and Silver at the Peterborough Special Olympic Gala in September.

In October the Year 11 student won Silver in the 25m Butterfly and Bronze in the 50m Freestyle at the Special Olympics Wales Regional Swimming Gala in Cardiff.

In November William won Gold in the

Butterfly and the Freestyle and Silver in the Backstroke in a disability gala.

Finally, Year 10 student Jack Duff came fourth out of 220 competitors in the Windermere Cross Lake Swim challenge organised by Chill Swim.

He completed the 1.2km swim in 17 minutes and 26 seconds. He was one of the youngest competitors and came second in his age group and third in his heat.

Jack also raised £250 in sponsorship money for Frank Water which supports clean water projects in India.



# STUDENTS WIN SILVER AT REGIONAL PANATHLON CHALLENGE

#### ELLIE REMEMBERS RELATIVE AT WAR CEMETERY

Mr Easterling left a wife and son when he died at the age of 35 on June 6th 1944.

Ellie said: "I was pleased that I could leave a cross on his grave.

"My grandfather was really proud

of me for doing it. It meant a lot to him."

Ellie's brother Callum, who is in Year 10, also had the opportunity to lay a cross on Mr Easterling's grave when he visited France with the Academy a few years ago.

During our latest trip the students visited a number of Second World War sites, including gun emplacements and the remains of Mulberry Harbour in Arromanches.

They also visited the Gothic abbey Mont Saint Michel, a French Market and saw the Bayeux Tapestry.

# PROFILE ON SAMANTHA ANDERSON

Mathematics Teacher Samantha Anderson became our new Head of Sixth Form this year. In Press caught up with her to see how she is settling into her new role.

Samantha Anderson is a popular face at our Academy. She worked as a Nuclear Engineer in Rolls Royce's submarine division before studying to be a teacher in Leicester.

"For me it seemed a natural development to apply for the role of Head of Sixth Form as it brings together many years of experience working with students in their final years at school.

"This year so far has been a fantastically busy time but I've enjoyed it.

"I'm already thinking about future plans and projects and I'm really looking forward to being involved with Curriculum Day this year."

Ms Anderson is full of praise for the students, who she says are wonderful to work with, and for her colleagues for the fantastic support they have offered her. She added: "The staff members are completely committed to the students. The students have a huge amount of support with their subjects and with applying for university, apprenticeships and jobs.

"We have good facilities at the Academy and run a range of initiatives, including the Young Enterprise programme, the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme and the Extended Project. Our staff give up their own time so they can support students with all these schemes.

"In addition, our Academy offers a wide range of work experience opportunities to students which I think is a real strength."

Ms Anderson also has a piece of key advice about work experience for all Sixth Formers.

She said: "The big thing that is coming through from the universities now is that they are looking for students to have relevant work experience – in some subjects it is a requirement. Work experience is no longer viewed as a good idea by universities – it is essential.

"Relevant work experience shows that you have looked into the course or career that you want to follow properly.

# SCIENTISTS CREATE GLASS BEADS

Scientists in Year 9 learned new skills when they took on the challenge to create beautiful glass beads.

The students melted borax in a variety of solutions to make coloured glass beads, including round and pear drop shaped beads, as part of the Cambridge Nationals in Science Programme.

Dr Rachel Causey said: "This project is about looking at the properties of materials and studying the huge amount of energy that was used to produce the glass and its environmental impact and then linking that to recycling and reducing energy use.

# PROFILE ON PCSO ALEX FRANKLIN

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Police Community Support Officer Alex Franklin is a familiar face around CBA. We caught up with him to find out more about his role here.

New students may have been surprised to see a PCSO walking around the Academy during their first term.

Every senior school in Corby has a PCSO assigned to them and for the past five years PCSO Alex Franklin has regularly visited four schools, including CBA.

He gives talks on crime prevention to students and parents and works with our Welfare and Attendance Officer but he sees his main role as forming good relationships between the police and the students.

He said: "Corby Business Academy was a pioneer in the development of the Safer Schools Partnership in Corby.

"In conversation with the Principal and the school body it emerged that, in general, children only tend to see the police if things have gone wrong which means the police can be seen in a bad light.

"By being in the schools regularly we are creating positive relationships between young people and the police."

One of the things PCSO Franklin does to help the students to relate to him is sit GCSE and A-Level examinations alongside them in his own time.

He said: "I've sat examinations alongside the students and I've waited for results with them. I think it's good if I can show them that I'm sharing some of their challenges with them." PCSO Franklin has also helped to promote a number of external projects within the Academy, including Northamptonshire Police's County Schools Challenge competition and the Jam in the Hood Project.

He said: "The County Schools Challenge is run by the police every year and invites students to pitch business proposals for products that will tackle crime. It's a great opportunity for the students here to show off their business expertise.

"We've also had several students involved in Northamptonshire Police's Jam in the Hood project. Through this they have got involved in community projects in their own time. In some cases students have become young leaders and at the end of the scheme they receive an Asdan accreditation in community volunteering."

Senior Vice Principal Janet Duggan believes PCSO Franklin helps the students to feel connected to the wider community.

She said: "Ofsted is very interested in what schools do to engage with fundamental British values, including democracy and the rule of law, and what schools do to recognise they are part of a wider community.

"Alex represents the rule of law and he is an example of the varied approaches that we employ to help students develop their social and cultural awareness."
