

SENATE WRAPS UP A SUCCESSFUL FIRST YEAR

A visit to the Mayor's parlour, an audience with the Governing body and devising a uniform donation scheme, have kept the Senate at the forefront of Academy activities during Term 6.

The Senate was personally invited by Mayor Cllr Mary Butcher and Leader Cllr Pat Fawcett to the council offices in George Street on Thursday, June 25.

Keen to hear what young people have to say the leader asked for questions from our community spirited senate members and top of the list was the issue of daytime public transport to and from the Academy and the Priors Hall area.

Year 9 student Kevin Karuga Ogwang asked what the plans were and Council leader Pat Fawcett said the authority would look into the issue and that the final decision would be made by the county authority.

She said: "Corby Council can't make

that decision but we can talk to the people that make the decisions. I think it is a good idea and once we get the wheels in motion I see now reason why it can't go ahead."

Two members of the Senate also presented the constitution before the Governing body. Year 9 rep Nicole Parsons and Year 11 rep Connor Wilson showed just how established the Senate has become in its first year when they joined a Governors meeting.

And another highlight was the idea for the uniform donation scheme. Year 11 student Sarah Hurley came up with the plan, which is set to be rolled out this coming Academic year.




SENATE MEMBER MICHAEL FORDE'S FIRST YEAR SUMMARY

PARENTS SURVEY

We have now completed the analysis of the surveys given to students, parents and staff. The feedback from everyone has been really useful in helping us plan for further improvements in our services and knowing what we have got right so far here at CBA.

With the information gathered both from these surveys; focus groups with parents; the regular input from student Forums and the Senate, as well as our staff consultation committee we think we have a good picture of our progress in this first year, including areas where you feel we still have work to do.

We asked a range of questions covering areas which are important for our development as a school. These included aspects of the 'Every Child Matters' agenda such staying safe; being healthy; enjoying and achieving; making a positive contribution and developing economic wellbeing. Due to space, only the main messages from the survey are presented in the results below, but if you would like to know more about a particular area, please contact Mrs Ashby who will be delighted to give you further detail.

SURVEY FEEDBACK - HEADLINES:

- The very large majority of students and parents who replied felt that CBA was a very safe place to learn.
- The very large majority of parents agreed that we have very high expectations of our staff and our students here at CBA.
- The large majority of students think their teachers are working hard to help them enjoy their learning and achieve their potential.
- The large majority of parents who responded felt the Academy actively encouraged them to get involved in its work.
- One area where parents would like to see further improvement is in ways they can communicate with the Academy.

BUSINESS LINKS & ENTERPRISE

FOCUS ON INTERNATIONAL TRADING



Year 7 students from Corby Business Academy and Brooke Weston were given an introduction to international trading during an Enterprise Day.

Young Enterprise East Midlands ran the event which was organised to help give students an insight into the intricacies of international trading.

Exports and imports, marketing, selling and advertising dominated the day as part of Young Enterprise's Our World programme.

Students were split into groups and took on the role of international companies, trading with each other to make the most profit.

Tracey Jones, a business volunteer delivering the programme, said: "The motto of Young Enterprise is to introduce students to the world of business through practical sessions."

Year 7 student Thomas Morby, said:

"We learned a lot about trading and how companies from different countries trade with each other.

"We also learned about interest rates and the financial side of trading and so it will make understanding the news easier."

As well as the activities at CBA an identical programme was being delivered at sister school Brooke Weston.

Young Enterprise's mission is to inspire and equip young people to learn and succeed through enterprise. Its vision is that all young people have the opportunity to gain personal experience of how business works, understand the role it plays in providing employment and creating prosperity, and be inspired to improve their own prospects, and the competitiveness of the UK.

YEAR 8 STUDENTS GO HEAD TO HEAD WITH STUDENTS FROM SISTER ACADEMY

Entrepreneurial spirit was in full flow when students were involved in a Young Enterprise initiative.

In a first event of its kind for the enterprise charity Young Enterprise East Midlands, Corby Business Academy and Brooke Weston Academy, Year 8 students pitted their business ideas against each other.

As part of the project, teams of students developed their concepts during a one day intensive brainstorm and on the following day the ideas were put before a judging panel at CBA business link Rockingham Motor Speedway.

After making it to the final, a CBA team won a creativity award for its Eco laptop idea. As part of the two-day intensive course the students were taught business skills through practical sessions. They had to come up with a product idea and then produce a prototype and deliver a presentation to sell their scheme to the judges.

Young Enterprise mentor Paul Howkins, put the students through their enterprise paces.

He said: "The business sector often complains that young people are not ready for the business world when they enter education, so it is important that business engages with schools to contribute to student's understanding.

"This course gives them an early insight into all matters of business, such as teamwork and problem solving and marketing.

He added: "I am seriously impressed with the level of innovation the students have shown."

MATHEMATICS & INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (MAIT)

MAIT STUDENTS ATTEND ROCKINGHAM FESTIVAL

Year 10 MAIT students took part in the Rockingham Festival in July. The students joined hundreds of other students from across the region to explore the world of Science, Technology, Maths and Engineering.

The event was a showcase in products for the future.

The students took part in a boat building challenge and some students proved to be winners on the day.

The Blue Boat Sail designed by Thomas Thompson, Amber Towler and Stephanie Fisher won the design for the fastest boat and the Black Boat Sail, produced by Lily Taitia and Jonathan Smith, won the prize for CBA best aesthetic design.

OUTDOOR MATHEMATICS

Maths was taken onto the sports field for a practical demonstration. MAIT teacher Maxwell Sam took his Year 7 students out into the sunshine to demonstrate geometry in action.

As you can see from these pictures, the students took on the role of the points around Mr Maxwell's fixed point.

During the exercise students learned that the locus is the path of a point from a fixed point. The path can form a circle or a straight line.

INVESTIGATIONS

During Term 6 in Key Stage 3 maths we have been completing AT1's otherwise known as investigations. These involve using and applying mathematics in a "creative" and "imaginative" way and students were encouraged to observe and describe what was happening at each stage of their investigation.

Students were given a problem solving task and started by having to decide what area of mathematics would be appropriate to belo solve the problem.

Once a pattern had been spotted predictions were made about what the students thought was actually happening. Every prediction then had to be tested and the students were able to prove or disprove their theory.

To extend this task, students had to introduce some form of algebra, usually as part of a formula.

At first this seemed quite daunting but once the students realised that they could describe what is happening in words, the algebra followed on quite easily. This has been the first time some students have tried an investigation but it has been fascinating to see the different ideas that they have adopted to solve the problems. This area of Mathematics encourages students to try their skills and ideas whilst helping to build their confidence in the subject

Year 9 students have sat online maths tests to assess how they have progressed this year. The questions set were similar to the standard of the now defunct SATs tests which were scrapped by the

Government last year. MAIT teacher David Joseph said: "We have been working over the last few weeks towards these tests which concentrate on the Key Stage 3 curriculum. "Students have been revising and doing test papers online so they have been able to progress each time and work on areas they have found more difficult.

"This is the first time we have tried an online test and the unique thing about it is that students are able to find out their results as soon as they have completed the test."

Year 9 student Michael Foley said: "The test was actually quite fun and I found it easier to concentrate as the questions were on the screen."



BUSINESS, **HUMANITIES & ENTERPRISE (BHE)**

OPERATION SNOWDONIA WANDERER 2009

Situation: Btec Public Services Year 10 Diploma group and Year 12 National group on expedition to North Wales as part of their Course assessment in Btec Public Services.

Mission: To climb Mount Moel Siabod at 850m high near Capel Curig in Snowdonia. This is to be done in full kit as all students are to wild camp in the National Park, being fully self sufficient.

Ground: Snowdonia National Park North Wales.

Execution: Twenty students left CBA on Monday 29th June in two mini buses. They were accompanied by myself and Mr Atkinson, the course leaders. Following an afternoon of training and preparation, the team had a quiet night under canvas ready to set out the next day. On a hot and humid Tuesday morning the team left civilisation behind and immediately started to climb away from Capel Curig and begin to ascend Moel Siabod. This proved to be a tough assignment as it was over 30 degrees and everyone was carrying packs of over 15 kg's.

Everyone worked hard to get to the top with the advance groups getting there by 1330 and the remainder within another half an hour. The afternoon was spent on a lovely ridge walk and then descent down to a wild camp area near a lake at the foot of the mountain.

Students spent Tuesday evening cooking, relaxing and dealing with blisters, most were asleep by 2200hrs.

Wednesday started early as the team set off on its return journey, this time on a course that took them through a vey picturesque valley which even took in a 12th century Castle. Again it was a very warm humid day and everyone worked hard to keep going. The expedition finally ended when a very weary and footsore group of students staggered back in to Capel Curig and the transport to take them home.

It was a tough trip but one that echoed the nature of this Btec course; teamwork, self reliance, courage and a sense of humour.

VICE PRINCIPAL TAKES PART IN THE APPRENTICE

Following the Key Stage 2 SATs Year 6 students had been put into four teams and, with a £10 start-up fund, challenged to make as much money as they could. Half of their proceeds would go to a charity of their choice and the rest to their end of term party.

The groups had worked really well together, demonstrating good enterprise skills. They had to produce a business plan and elect a project leader, an accountant and a publicity officer for their group. Activities ranged from car washes to cake baking.

Our job was to listen to their presentations, ask questions and decide which group was hired. It was quite difficult as all groups had made a superb effort. The car wash team were the ones who were hired.

In recognition of their work all teams were invited to the Academy, where they performed their presentations to an audience of Year 10 and Year 12 business studies students. They were extremely impressed with the level of commitment, standard of presentation and the wealth of enterprise skills demonstrated by the Year 6 teams.

Year 9 Trip to Fairline Boats

As part of Design and Technology Week a group of Year 9 students had the opportunity to visit world renowned boat builders Fairline Boats. Based in Corby the company designs and builds boats for the high end luxury market.

The students were welcomed to the Corby site and given a brief introduction to the manufacturing processes involved in boat production. Then, in small groups, they were taken on a guided tour of each stage of manufacture. Even though the size of the boats is far greater than anything the students would undertake, the design and make processes were generally the same as are found in the GCSE Resistant Materials course.

After the tour, time was given for a question and answer session with the Factory Manager who stressed the importance of having a well educated workforce that had well developed personal skills, in particular the ability to work in teams.

This was a fantastic opportunity for our students to see, at first hand in the real world, the Design and Make processes they are taught in Design Technology lessons. I am sure the students would like to say thanks to those at Fairline Boats for a very worthwhile visit.

The Discovery Centre is a unique residential facility on over 20 acres of ground close to Lake Victoria in Junja, Uganda.

The project is run in partnership with United Kingdom registered charity Adventure Projects Trust and YWAM (Youth With A Mission), Uganda. It was established in 1994 as a response to the dire situation in regard to AIDS in the country at that time.

During the trip – which takes place from October 28 to November 5 – the students will attend a Sixth Form Conference along with peers from other English and African Schools.

Principal Andrew Campbell said: "This trip will be a launch pad for many more exciting trips for CBA students.

"The Academy is not just a place in Corby, it is a window to a whole range of other opportunities all around the world."



The fundraising efforts to cover the £4,000 costs have already started.
















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STUDENTS GET ACTIVE

GETTING INVOLVED IN THE AWARDS PROCESS




