Our Academy also has a Designated Special Provision Unit with hydrotherapy pool and specialist equipment.

All of the students were smartly dressed in uniform comprising black blazers with the green Academy logo. After meeting their teachers they then went for assembly held in the massive theatre where Dr. Campbell welcomed them to the Academy. The students were then taken to the restaurant where breakfast was served before the working day got into full swing with a packed programme of activities and lessons.

At all times staff were on hand to assist and make sure the first day got off to a successful start. Senior staff, teachers and support staff were all enthusiastic and raring to go.

ARTS MUSIC & INDUSTRIAL DESIGN (AMID)



PHYSICAL AND NATURAL SCIENCES (PNS)

Welcome to PNS, Physical and Natural Sciences .In this faculty our staff are qualified in Science, Active Sports, Movement and PHSE. We have a superb team of individuals who bring together their experience of the world to enable youngsters to achieve in both academic and physical pursuits.

We aim to improve their understanding of the world, to harness their desire to explore it while becoming physically and mentally active, and improve their understanding of it.

Our Mind and Body curriculum has been created to offer a myriad of different physical and mentally stimulating experiences in each year group. Some of these build on skills throughout KS3 e.g. Pilates and Yoga, indoor rowing, and circuits. Others are introduced to students as they mature, for example, relationships, health, emotional wellbeing and drugs. All students at KS3 will have the opportunity to achieve a foundation qualification before they enter Year 10.

Every week, all students receive active sports skills, Mind and Body and Science education which also included further thinking skills and experimentation. Some of our GCSE students are now taking three separate sciences.

At KS4/5, all students also get offered active time in which they have opportunities to play sports or do individual activities like trampolining, or take part in cheerleading and dance. Many of our young people have taken sports and dance into KS4 at GCE level and our 6th form students are also studying both Biology and Sport at A level.

With now both a Mind an Body studio which offers step classes, yoga and Pilates, weight training, indoor rowing and spinning and our Dance studio, staff get the chance to be active too.

ARTS MUSIC & INDUSTRIAL DESIGN (AMID)

Welcome to the Mathematics and Information Technology Faculty, where students will develop their knowledge of the international languages of Maths and CT. They will learn the functional skills of numeracy and computing, necessary for their future careers and have opportunities to be creative problem solvers. They will discover how to use mathematics to describe and make sense of the world around them and appreciate the awe and wonder of natural patterns and connections. They will learn to use a range of software in an integrated way with other technology such as cameras and sound recording equipment. In the faculty we have a wide range of resources and facilities including five ICT suites, dedicated Mathematics rooms and a huge array of practical equipment and books. At Ks3 all students study Maths and ICT, at Ks4 all students continue to follow a variety of Maths courses and some choose to follow qualifications in ICT. They will have the opportunity to gain a whole host of qualifications including A Level and Vocational GCE, GCSE and OCR Nationals and Adult Numeracy Level One and Two.

Students will also have the opportunity to choose to study finance, learning how to manage money and the essential life skills of budgeting and financial planning. This study will also lead to GCSE equivalent qualifications, giving students the opportunity to gain up to seven GCSEs in MAIT Faculty. The staff team are experienced subject specialists, enthusiastic to share their love of both ICT and Maths and ready to challenge all students to strive to achieve their absolute best.

We have invested in new text book resources including maths homework text books for all students, alongside many ICT based resources. Almost all of Y11 will be taking GCSE Maths in November and Y9, 10 and 11 students will be taking on-line Numeracy tests as soon as they feel confident, that they are ready to pass.

Students have already risen to the challenge of working at higher levels and we are impressed by their commitment to completing on-line homework and emailing their teachers both questions and completed work. Many have also chosen to stay on at the end of day to make use of the computers and benefit from the additional support available from their teachers'.

We are eagerly awaiting the arrival of Matheletics and ICT Voting Machines and look forward to holding "Millionaire" Competitions and to students entering on-line competitions with other schools both nationally and internationally.

Behaviour

"MARK'S SPORTING AMBITION"

Mark Allen, Gladiator trainer and Olympic hopeful has taken part in his first major competition having only been competing in the hammer event for just over a year. Already he has smashed his personal best record and now has his sights set firmly on qualifying for the 2012 Olympics.

Mark, who works for Corby Business Academy in a sports development role, has had an action-packed year. He devised the training schedule for the Gladiators and contenders featured in the recent Sky series, training them and road-testing their punishing tasks.

He said: 'We tested the Gladiators on their all-round fitness. We had 56 gladiators and contenders in all and I had to teach them about the new games. Once the studio was ready I tested every single game for health and safety reasons, so that was a bit tiring!.' Now the seven-week stint of training and filming is finished Mark has time to devote to his hammer throwing, a strenuous and potentially dangerous sport. He had hoped to be throwing distances of 50 to 55 metres this year, but after being coached by John Anderson, the Gladiator referee, he has already recorded a personal best time of 59.5 metres. Mark's most recent throw was at the Alexander Stadium in Birmingham where high performing athletes could gain a place in the Olympic qualifiers. He threw a distance of 56.33m on his first throw but unfortunately his next two were disallowed. He said: 'Because of all my other commitments it was only my third competition of the season and it was a really important one. I could have done better but I know where I can improve. I've got a few more competitions lined up for this season and then I'll look to go on next year and go on up the ranks.' Olympic athletes traditionally make four turns before releasing the 14lb hammer. Mark is currently only making three, but by incorporating the fourth it will add impetus and force to his already powerful throws.

Mark, who eats six Weetabix for breakfast and trains regularly has already been a successful decathlete and even taught himself to pole-vault from scratch, studying other vaulters to perfect his own technique. He said:' 'I worked my way up and managed to get myself to the Under-15 national championships after watching what other kids were doing right and what they were doing wrong. I picked up a few tips here and there.' At the peak of his pole-vaulting career he cleared 4m 40, the height of a double-decker but then tore a hamstring, which meant he retired from decathlon events and it was then that he took up hammer throwing.

He said: 'Next season I'm looking to be throwing in the 60 metre range and being in the top four or five in Britain. The following season there's the Commonwealth Games and obviously I have my eye on the Olympics in 2012. That's a definite target which I'm aiming for.'
