Sixth Form Vice Principal, Avril Bartley-Smith said: "The Sixth Form at Corby Business Academy is going from strength to strength. A significant number of our Year 11 students and external applicants are being interviewed to discuss their future aspirations and their application to join the Sixth Form.

"It is important that students make the right choice at this point in their lives as they finish compulsory education. We will continue to support students to make the right choice for them as individuals. The application process has included discussions about their future pathways and the qualifications need to achieve their ambition.

From September there will be an increased number of courses on offer to Sixth Form students. This has been a result of sufficient student interest.

The cabbage was placed in a glass container and water was added and then both were heated over a Bunsen burner.

The heating process turned the cabbage liquid into a PH indicator so that when acidic liquids such as lemon and vinegar were added the water turned pink and it went a shade of turquoise when an alkali was dropped in.

AUSCHWITZ CONCENTRATION CAMP

Whilst on a short break to Poland recently I went to visit Auschwitz concentration camp.

It was a cold, windy and drizzling with rain. I recognised the gates from the films that I had watched on the holocaust.

We had a tour guide who spoke English and showed us around the camp and exhibitions.

There we saw the piles of clothes; a mixture of children and adults that had been taken off the people when they first arrived at the camp.

They were made to put on striped thin uniform which looked like pyjamas no socks or shoes. Depending on your nationality where you came from you were given a different badge.

As we walked through the place it was very moving.

We saw a glass case the size of a class room which was full of hair. This was very emotional as children's hair were still plaited where the Germans had roughly cut it off the children and adults.

The hair was then used to make cloth for the troops on the front line. The huts were freezing with the wind blowing in from every direction and you can only imagine the smell and noise that you would have to sleep in.

I discovered that awful experiments were carried out on the prisoners. There was a standing cell where when you had finished your work four of you were placed in a tiny space all night without being able to sit down or lie down.

The tour guide said that it only took 20 minutes to kill hundreds at a time with the

gas, and then the doors would have been opened to allow the gas to clear so that the dead bodies could be removed to be cremated. Then the whole process would be repeated again.
