Parents are being asked to reserve their child's place as soon as possible following receipt of the letter. We will have set up an electronic pay system accessible through our website so parents have the option of paying online or by the usual method of sending in a cheque accompanied by the return slip. Trips out of school will require a deposit to secure a place (which will be refundable if the trip is unable to go ahead because of insufficient numbers).

CBA ACHIEVED ITS BEST EVER SET OF GCSE AND A LEVEL RESULTS THIS SUMMER.

More than three quarters of students (77 percent) gained five or more A* to C grades at GCSE and 55% of students achieved As and Bs in Level 3 courses (A Levels and vocational subjects) - a significant improvement on the previous year.

Deputy Executive Principal of the Brooke Weston Partnership Andrew Campbell said: "These results are a clear indication of the ambition of CBA and what we have achieved in the three years since opening. The results are testament to the hard work and determination of students and their teachers."

At GCSE our students showed great strength in the highly valued GCSE subjects with good performances in subjects such as History, Music and English Literature - in which 65 percent of students gained the top rated A* or A qualifications.

The event was the Volkswagon Racing Cup, which attracts competitors from around the country. The trio, Josh Farr, Thomas Jeffery and Daniel Gair, went along with Lunar Racing, a motorsport team based at our neighbour Rockingham Motor Speedway. The racing team specialises in education, working with students aged from 14-18 to build and maintain real racing cars that compete against professional racing teams in professional championships.

Thomas Jeffery, who intends on becoming a World Rally Series mechanic, said: "It was just an amazing experience.

"We were able to go into the garages and have a look at the real world of motorsport.

"It has confirmed even more that I want to work as a mechanic." The three students are all studying their Institute of Motoring Industry (IMI) Level 2 with Lunar Racing.

The two year course contains both theoretical study and practical study.



MAKING POPULAR MUSIC

More than 160 students are now receiving music tuition here at CBA. In order to service the high levels of students who want to study an instrument, our music staff team are being supplemented by ten members of peripatetic staff who come in to give specialist tuition.

The peripatetic staff are often professional musicians or former teachers who have been brought in by Director of Music Clive Wears to ensure students are receiving the best levels of tuition. Gary Fountain is a former member of the GUS Band and teaches the brass instruments.



He said: "We can assess the students as to whether the instrument is the right one and then work on their technique.

"I have found the students here to be motivated and very capable and there is a strong musical community being built here at CBA."

Students have either a 20 minute individual or shared lesson depending on the standard they have reached. The majority of students are working towards examinations.

A new archery club has also been founded in Corby and so anyone who develops a passion for the sport will have the opportunity to join.




CALL TO DANCE FOR YEAR 7 STUDENTS
