Members of the company manned stalls at Young Enterprise fairs in the Swansgate Shopping Centre in Wellingborough on December 1, and in the Grosvenor Centre, Northampton, on December 2.

Members of Kraftees sold their products – Christmas cards and USB sticks on wristbands – to the public alongside Young Enterprise teams from other county schools.

The teams were judged at each event and awards were given out. In Wellingborough Kraftees was given the award for Best Sales and Marketing Strategy and at the fair in Northampton the team was awarded Best Trade Stand.

Young Enterprise link teacher Alexandra Allan said: "The judges were extremely impressed and the feedback was amazing."

Shaun Coleman from RS Components, which has

been supporting Kraftees, said: "At the trade fair in Wellingborough they were professional, they were all good ambassadors for Corby Business Academy and they interacted with the other students, which was good.

"They did well for their first fair and won their awards for Best Trade Stand and Best Sales and Marketing Strategy, the latter of which is a key one in business."

RAISING OF THE PARTICIPATION AGE

Under the present law, the school leaving age is 16. After 2013 the education leaving age will rise to 17 and from 2015 it will rise again to 18.

The raising of the participation age (RPA) means:

- From September 2013 Year 11 students must continue in education or training to age 17
- From September 2015 students must continue in education or training to age 18

Implications for students in this year's Year 11 (academic year 2012-13)

Students must stay in education or training until the end of the academic year they are 17.

Does this mean that students need to stay on at school?

- **No.** There are different interpretations of what counts as "staying in learning", including work based learning such as an apprenticeship or starting a business

Implications for parents

- Young people cannot leave school with no learning pathway identified
- Child benefit will continue while the young person is in learning
- Some vocational training may start later at age 17 and continue longer
- The Academy will continue to monitor the young person's destination after they have left
- Benefits will stop the first Monday in September if a child is not in some form of education or training

ENGLAND CRICKETERS TAKE PART IN TOURNAMENTS DURING CBA VISIT

Two England cricketers took part in cricket tournaments with Year 8 and Year 9 students during a visit to CBA.

Jenny Gunn and Danielle Hazell from the England Cricket Board spent a day with the active department in November.

They took part in a tournament played by Year 8 girls and then in a mixed tournament of Year 9 students.

Jenny said: "Some of the girls were very good and were getting competitive. It was good to have so many people playing cricket at once."

A Session 4 girls' cricket club will be set up from January.



STUDENTS TURN DETECTIVES AT CLASSROOM CRIME SCENE

Students investigated the scene of a crime as part of a module on forensic science.

To help with their revision PCSO Alex Franklin turned their classroom into a crime scene, complete with a number of possible murder weapons and fingerprints.

PCSO Franklin said: "I went over fingerprinting with the pupils, got them to take fingerprints and described how we would deal with a crime scene.

"After that we got one of the pupils to dress up in the overalls, gloves and face mask that scenes of crime officers would wear and got

them to enter the crime scene, identify what could have been used for a murder weapon and what would be good for evidence, then bag them in the proper evidence bags."

PCSO Franklin then showed the students how to take fingerprints from a glass beaker found at the scene using the aluminium powder that scenes of crime officers would use at a real crime scene.

He said: "All this was done as an interesting and fun way to help the pupils to revise for a test on the subject."



RUNNING CLUB SET TO CONTINUE

The Session 4 running club which has been taking place on Mondays is set to continue into the new year.

The club was recently started to give students the chance to prepare for cross country fixtures and to give

students and staff the chance to increase basic fitness levels.

Teacher Natasha Dunstone said: "We have had many different students coming along to the club so far, therefore we will continue to run it into the new year."

STUDENTS TAKE ON TOUGH CROSS COUNTRY COURSE

More than 30 CBA students of all ages took part in a tough cross country fixture.

A total of 34 students, from Year 7s to Year 12s, took part in the gruelling fixture at a wet and muddy West Glebe Park in Corby in November. Despite the harsh conditions, CBA celebrated a number of successes.

CBA placed first in the Under 17 Boys Team competition with 68 points and second in the Under 15 Boys Team competitions with 87 points.

CBA students also triumphed in the girls' categories, taking first place in the Under 17 Girls Team competition with 29 points and second in the Under 15 Girls Team competition with 165 points.

Teacher Natasha Dunstone said:

"Congratulations to all the students who took part. We also have a number of students through to the county trials later on in the school year."

STUDENTS' CAMPAIGN ON ISSUES

Year 10 students devised campaigns on issues of their choice for a citizenship project.

One group – Beth Fennell, Heather Phillips, Amy Moore, Daniel Bottrill and Becky Scott – presented their campaign on the right to die to hundreds of other CBA students in assembly.

The group devised a petition on the issue and contacted local MP Andy Sawford to tell him about their campaign.

Heather said: "We feel that this is a very serious issue as anyone could be fine today and end up in a life-changing situation tomorrow."

Beth said: "The campaign has gone really well. Everyone has been really supportive and everyone who saw the assembly congratulated us."

"The aim of our assembly was to start a debate on the subject and we felt that both sides of the story needed to be put across."

Another group – Bianca Ursu, Georgina

Reay, Roisin Cúrran and Kyla Bité – focused on domestic violence against men for their campaign and also presented their work during assemblies.

Bianca said: "We strongly believe that men should receive an equal amount of support to women and that everyone should be more aware of this issue."

Georgina said: "We would like to help support men that are still in abusive relationships or have suffered from domestic violence."

"We hope to get as many responses as possible to drive this campaign further than the school's gates and make ourselves heard."

William Bell, Nicole Vuckovic, Taila Miller and Chloe Smith chose to campaign about drugs, underage pregnancy, smoking and drinking.

William said: "Drugs can damage the nervous system, they're dangerous."

All work contributes to the students' GCSE Citizenship coursework.

CHIMPANZEE SANCTUARY



Visiting the Ngamba Chimpanzee Rehabilitation Centre in Uganda was one of the highlights of the trip! A huge Grinch advent calendar was put on display and every morning a new question was revealed. Students were challenged with answering the book-based question every day and keeping track of their answers.

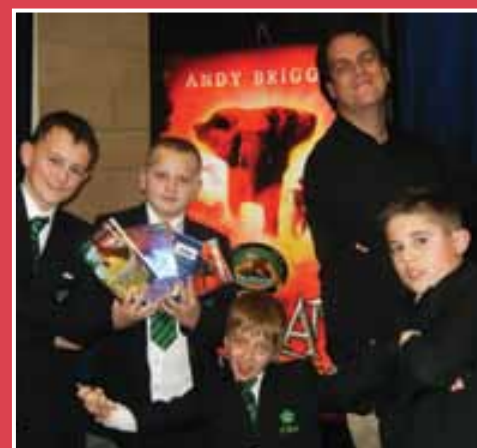
A small prize was awarded to a student with the correct answer daily and a host of larger prizes will be awarded to students who have got all answers correct at the end of term.

The tutor group in Key Stage 4 which filled the most shoeboxes was Nikki Clark's tutor group in the DSP, who filled 12 shoeboxes.

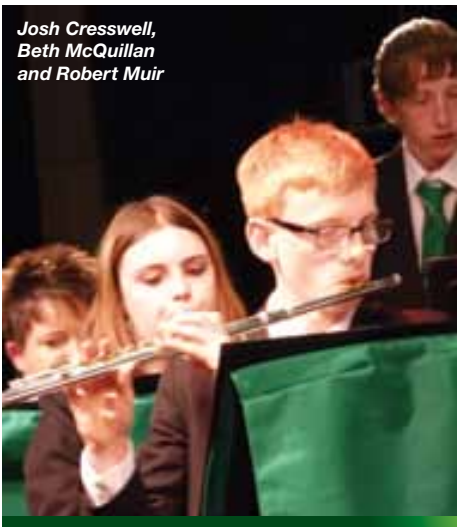

The challenge was to create a tree with decorations based on a Christmas song related to the faculty. At least half of the decorations had to be handmade by staff or students.

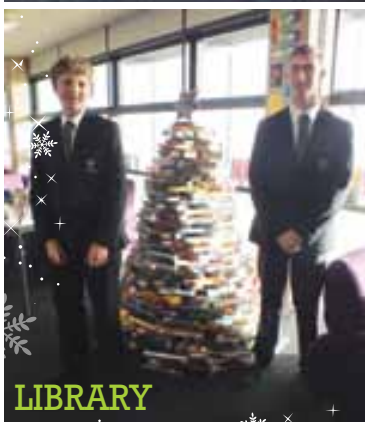
Comms decorated their tree based on the Christmas song 'Fairytale of New York' by The Pogues and Kirsty MacColl and hung postcards of New York City on it.
