WELL DONE TO OUR STUDENTS FOR ACHIEVING EARLY MATHS PASSES AT TOP GRADES

Congratulations to more than 120 of our Year 11 and Year 10 students who have secured themselves top GCSE Maths grades early. We have 86 Year 11 students who are celebrating after completing the GCSE six months early and securing high marks – 13 students achieved A* or A grades, 22 achieved a B and 51 achieved a C grade. We also have 38 Year 10 students who now have just one exam left to sit before they complete their GCSE Maths too, after they

achieved top marks in the last modular exam. In the last set of modular results, all of the Year 10 students who sat the exams achieved a C or above, with 29 students achieving grades A* to B. When they have sat the final exam they will have completed GCSE Maths a year early. Principal John Henrys said: "It's a very pleasing set of results and is a result of the hard work the students and staff have put in over the last few months. "It's a significant achievement for the Academy and

takes us one step closer to the challenging targets we have set ourselves for the academic year. "Thank you and well done to all of the staff, parents and students for working so hard to achieve this." Director of Maths, Heather Thompson, said: "The Year 11 results are superb, they are really pleased and their teachers are very proud of them. "The Year 10s have shown extraordinary commitment."

ACADEMY NEWS

More than 30 CBA students spent the day at Oxford University learning about the university and several of the subjects taught there. The group visited on February 1st and found out more about studying Classics, Computer Science and Russian. They had a look at some of the university buildings and ate lunch at Worcester College. The aim of the visit was to introduce the students to a range of more unusual academic subjects. Teacher Felicity Cornish said: "When we arrived the students had a talk about going to Oxford which debunked some of the myths about student life and told them more about what students need to do in order to get in; and a bit about what the courses are like. "We had a talk about Classics from two professors who spoke about their areas of interest, which were tombs and Greek sculptures. "We went to Computer Science, where the students had a lecture on cyber security and took part in a demonstration of how messages are passed between computers securely. "Then my sister Helen, who studied Russian at Oxford, talked to the students about her year abroad and what it's like to study languages at university."

BUSINESSMAN GIVES ADVICE TO SIXTH FORM STUDENTS

Businessman Phil Ewers came in to CBA to pass on advice to help Sixth Form students when they are looking for their first job.

Mr Ewers has 22 years of experience in management roles and works as a Business Development Manager for a market-leading firm involved in high-end technologies, including biometrics.

He gave a presentation to Sixth Formers which was about the process of looking for a job, applying for the position and going for an interview.

He advised students to keep an up-to-date CV of a maximum of two A4 pages and to tailor their CV to the job they are applying for.

Mr Ewers also gave the students advice on writing covering letters and networking.

He has two children who are students at CBA and offered to come in to school to speak as part of the Business Specialism initiative. Letters were sent home to parents last year asking parents in business to consider coming in to share their expertise and advice.

CITIZENSHIP STUDENTS GET LETTERS FROM MP

Citizenship students who have been campaigning about issues in their lessons received replies from letters they wrote to local MP Andy Sawford.

Two of the Year 10 groups wrote to Mr Sawford about their campaigns.

One group wrote to him about their campaign on University fees. Group member Daniel O'Connor said: “We asked him if he would

take the issue to Parliament and what his opinions on it were. He wrote back and said because he is very busy he would try and arrange a meeting with us about the issue and that he agreed with us.”

Another group – Beth Fennell, Heather Phillips, Amy Moore, Daniel Bottrill and Becky Scott – wrote to Mr Sawford about their campaign on the right to die and also received a reply from the MP.

LEARNING ABOUT THE FAMILY

Year 7s have been learning to talk about the family in French with the help of the Royal Family.

Students wore masks of various royals and used their language skills to describe how they were related to one another.

Director of Modern Foreign Languages, Karen Turney, said: “We thought this would be a fun way to help the students to learn and enjoy languages.”

MEDIA STUDENTS ORGANISE PROMOTIONAL FLASH MOB

Year 11 media students came up with a creative and memorable way to promote a product by organising their own flash mob in school.

As part of GCSE media studies, students have been working on ways to market and promote a product of their choice.

Leah Findlay, Chelsea Chadyiwa and Kate Cummings chose customisable all in ones – known as onesies – for their product. For their flash mob they enlisted the help of teachers and students to perform a dance routine.

Some of their volunteers got dressed up in onesies for the flash mob, which was recorded.

A flashmob is when a group of people assemble suddenly in a public place, perform an unusual and seemingly pointless act – often a dance routine – and then quickly disperse.

They began as entertainment but have been increasingly used by companies, who organise and stage a flash mob and then use a recording of it as a television advert.

Katie said: “We decided we wanted to do something that would stand out from the crowd so we thought a flash mob would be a great idea.”

Leah said: “I think it was really good and I’m proud of it. I think it would help to sell the product in real life.”

Teacher Claire Howsam said: “The students had to come up with their own product to appeal to a teen and tween audience. They had to produce TV, magazine and radio adverts.

“This group went for a flash mob as it’s inventive and creative.”





Two students also had a go at a wand flying simulation over Hogwarts. Librarian Amy McKay said: "It was a great day and the students really enjoyed it, it was really good for seeing how the films were made. The library is now pleased to have two iPads available for students to use. They will primarily be used to access Accelerated Reader quizzes, but have also been loaded with plenty of literacy and word games, newspapers, ebooks and interactive apps based on popular books.

LIBRARIAN AMY BEGINS CARNEGIE JUDGING

CBA's librarian Amy McKay travelled to London in January to begin the process of choosing the nation's best children's book.

Amy was a judge in last year's Carnegie and Greenaway Children's Book Awards and has reprised her role for the second and final time for this year's awards.

When the long list of titles up for the two awards was announced, Amy began the long task of reading each one. She read and took notes on 68 novels and the illustration work in 64 titles.

Amy met with the other judges last month to begin whittling down the long list into two shortlists.

She will now read all of the shortlisted books again before meeting the other judges once more to decide which books win the two medals.

Amy said: "I absolutely loved the judging. We have chosen the shortlist now so I will keep re-reading those

books for the next few months and in May we will decide the winner, then there will be an awards ceremony in June.

"It's been fantastic and a real privilege to do it. I will be gutted when I'm not doing it next year."


PROM COMMITTEE RAISES £1,100
