## NEW TEAM OF REPORTERS WILL WORK WITH BBC

A newly selected team of CBA reporters will be joining forces with the BBC to broadcast to the nation. On March 15th our team of 20 CBA Newshounds will report the news for the day, with the final edit posted onto a BBC news website.

The scheme is being run by Gifted and Talented coordinator Claire Howsam, who will work alongside a specially designated BBC mentor to teach the students new media and reporting skills.

Miss Howsam said: "This is an opportunity for students to report the news that they think is interesting in a way that will appeal to an audience of their age.

"They will be assigned into different teams and specialise in different areas.

"It will be a great way for them to discover how the media operates."

The Newshounds had to apply via letter for a place on the scheme outlining why they would be a suitable journalist.

Special mention goes to Year 7 student Chloe Burton who wrote a rhyming poem around the acronym CBA Newshound.

Year 10 student Mia Penny said: "I want to be a journalist and work in magazines, so I think this is going to be a great way of gaining new skills."

The training for the big day will begin in January with Session 4 activities on a Tuesday.

The Newshounds will be trained in all areas of news production, from scripting, reporting, to camerawork and editing.

## A UGANDAN EDUCATION

Two Sixth Form students have made a life changing visit to Uganda.

Chrissie Moore and Sophie Allen were accompanied by CBA librarian Amy McKay on the CBA's third annual visit to the Sixth Form Conference in Uganda.

The trio spent five days in the African country where they took part in debates about global issues as well as visiting primary schools and some areas of cultural importance.

As well as an educational trip, the team also took along a cash pot of £2000 – raised from the generous CBA community – and used the money to buy hundreds of books for the Discovery Centre.

The Centre in Jinja (a four hour road journey from the Ugandan capital of Kampala) was founded in the 1990s by a Northamptonshire charity and acts as an educational resource centre for young people on the local community – as well as across Uganda.

Miss McKay said: “The library was non-existent when we arrived as the centre does struggle for funds.

“After speaking with the students and asking what books they would like, we went along with staff from the centre to the bookshop and bought 370 books.

“We bought several copies of some educational texts, but also bought some more contemporary books such as a book about Justin Bieber and some Hannah Montana ones.”

The staff told Miss McKay the books would be life changing for many students as it will greatly increase their education opportunities.

Following the visit there will be a literature link established between the two schools.

Miss McKay will this year be one of the judges for the prestigious Carnegie award and so she hopes to send the shortlisted books over to the Ugandan school so that the students can read the books and give their verdict.

There will be a SKYPE session so that CBA and the Ugandan students can discuss the reads.

**Chrissie said:** “I can describe the whole experience in one word – amazing! The experience began when I found out I was going – it wasn't just about getting on a plane to Uganda.

“While in Uganda, we visited primary schools, local landmarks and the best part of all was that we were able to make a massive difference to the lives of students over there. Extra fundraising money meant that we were able to buy 370 books for the Discovery Centre.

“The Ugandan's made us feel very welcome throughout our stay.”

**Sophie said:** “Uganda was not what I expected at all – there is so much greenery and so many goats. The traffic was awful and quite frightening, constant beeping, animals wandering into the middle of the road, people on motorbikes not holding onto anything or wearing a helmet!

“We did meet wonderful people and made lots of friends, I had the most amazing week of my lifetime and had so many experiences that will stay with me forever.”

## HOLIDAYS DURING TERM TIME – THE LAW

The law states that parents should not normally remove their child from school during term time for a holiday. Under Government guidelines we will only consider permitting holidays in term time where both the application is made to the Principal in advance of the holiday (by a parent the student normally lives with) and where there are special reasons for needing to take the holiday (for example the inflexibility of the parents' holiday leave). Parents need to pay attention to the law on this matter and follow the correct procedure or else they may be issued with a penalty notice.

## ONLINE PAYMENT SYSTEM LAUNCHED

Parents can now pay for catering and trips online following the launch of our new online payment system. To save parents time and to prevent students handling cash in the Academy, we have implemented a new system called WisePay, which allows parents to deal with any money matters in a secure way. A personal account for each student has been generated and parents with more than one child at CBA have the ability to merge accounts. The catering section of the system also gives parents the facility to view what their child is purchasing from the restaurant. Finance manager Linda Stubbins said: "We sent letters home to all parents informing them of the new service, instructions on how to use the WisePay accounts and login details. We have had a very good take up rate so far, parents will be able to see the details of their child's account and keep up to date with trip information and payment dates." The function to pay for music tuition will soon be available. A Level Media Studies students will be taking inspiration from a cult film to learn about the art of movie making.

The students in Media Studies teacher Simon Smith's A2 course have been tasked with recreating scenes from the film Juno in preparation for making their own trailers next term.

## LET THE BATTLE COMMENCE



Year 7 students re-enacted the Battle of Hastings 1066 and the Norman Conquest during a lesson this term.

History teacher Samantha Stacey writes: "On the death of Edward the Confessor, our history students discovered that there were three main contenders for the English throne – Harold Godwinson, William of Normandy and Harald Hardrada – the Viking king. "With tables and chairs pushed to one side, students took on roles and positions of strategic

military importance to discover through role-play why Harold lost and William won.

"With a hairdryer blowing William across the English Channel, and the Viking King dead with a single blow of the axe, students soon realised that a weary and exhausted Harold had to march his army all the way from York to Hastings to fight once more. "William's tactics and preparation led to victory against the Saxon king, and an extended piece of writing for Term Two's History assessment".

## MEDICINAL PURPOSES

Year 9 History students started the new GCSE topic Medicine Through Time this term.

The development study covers medicine through time, from Ancient Greece to the present day.

The activity required students to physically place themselves on a timeline to demonstrate different periods in history, in addition to assessing average life expectancy during each period. They also looked at the key medical developments and factors that hindered the progress of medicine.

Their first GCSE History exam is in June 2012.

## CRICKET SELECTION

Four promising CBA cricketers have been selected for a talent programme. They will train at one of seven 'hub's created across the country and be assessed by MCC staff.

Cricket Coach Jordan Joseph, who set up the cricket team as a student and is now a member of staff, said: "This is an excellent opportunity for the boys and will be a great way to bring themselves to the attention of the county cricket scouts."

Thomas Keeney, who is the Under 13s captain and plays for Corby Stewarts and Lloyds Under 13s team, said: "It is a real honour to have been picked and I can't wait to start."

Thomas Chenery, who along with Zak and Jonathon is a player for Weldon Cricket Club's Under 13s team said: "I would love to play for the county one day."



His dad Clive, who is also a CBA parent governor said: "Thomas has been playing cricket since a very young age and has always had an interest in the sport.

"I am really impressed with the cricket coaching team here and the support they give to the students.

"The highlight of Thomas's first year at CBA was the cricket tour to Torquay, which he said was excellent."

The training begins on Saturday, January 7th.

## OUT ON THE WATER

A group of students braved the waters of a local reservoir as part of their BTEC Public Services course.

The Year 10 and 11 students took part in team building activities at Rutland Water as part of their public service skills unit.

Active teacher James Aston who runs the course, said: "They kayaked around a distant buoy and tried paddling backwards, swapping kayaks and paddling standing up.

"Their second activity was raft building, which was completed to various levels of competence. Three groups managed to sail their rafts, while the rest got stuck in the mud or saw their rafts fall apart in the water.

"The groups were a credit to the Academy and all of the students participated well in to activity, even though they got very muddy and wet."

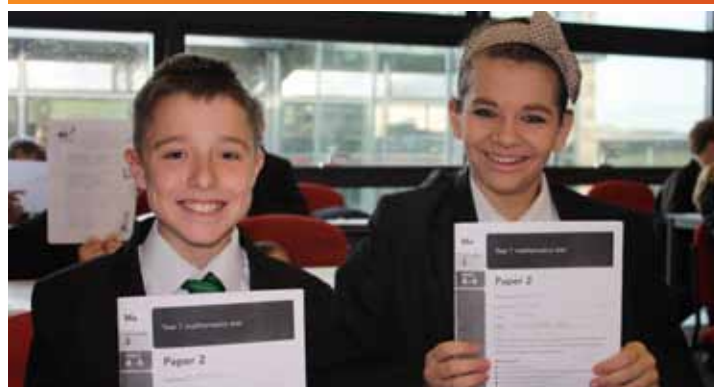
## TEACHER JOINS UNIVERSITY SELECTION PANEL

The Senate representatives were selected after being voted in as Form representatives and then putting themselves forward for selection to the Senate.


















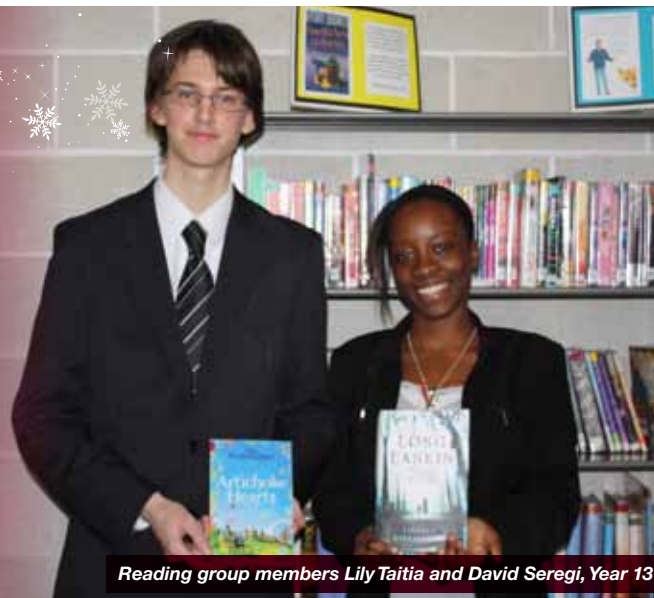
# LIBRARY

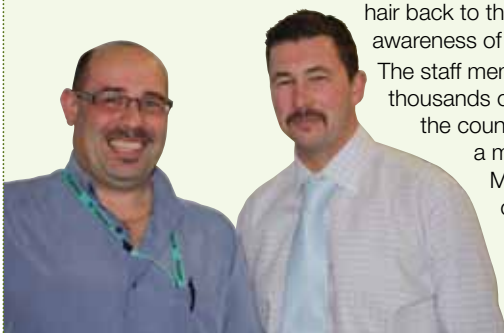

## STAFF DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

CBA teachers John Atkinson and Natasha Dunstone have become the first graduates of a new development programme.

The Brooke Weston Middle Leadership Programme was launched this year and is aimed at closing the achievement gap in schools by giving staff training in how to develop new teaching and management strategies.

The intensive course took place over ten months and included residential sessions and regular meetings with colleagues and mentors.

Acting Principal John Henrys said: "John and Natasha undertook a piece of work looking at the performance of an identified group of students that were underperforming in both English and Mathematics.

Mr Atkinson, who is a Business teacher

within the BHE Faculty, said: "The course has definitely helped my career and has hugely increased my confidence and completely changed the way I look at things. It has given me an overall whole-school perspective and has increased my confidence to work with different areas of the school."

Miss Dunstone, who is a PE teacher within the Active department, said: "The course was a real insight to the way schools use data to run efficiently and effectively. It was a worthwhile experience that opened my eyes to a variety of approaches to leadership and management within the school environment."

Nine teachers from the three BWP Partnership Academies (CBA, Kettering Science Academy and Brooke Weston Academy) enrolled on the course.



## JUSTICE IN ACTION

Students auditioned for their part in the magistrates Mock Trial project at the end of term.

Led by BHE teacher Samantha Stacey, the project has been running at CBA since the Academy opened and has become an established fixture.

The scheme is a national competition for Year 8 and Year 9 students.

Its aim is to make students familiar with the vital role magistrate's courts play in the criminal justice system. It helps students

to develop their understanding of criminal law, the criminal justice system and how courts work in a fun and innovative way.

Parents and carers of G&T students will be informed by letter of the details nearer the time.



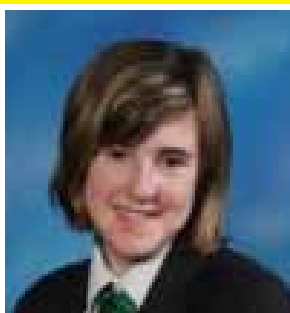
## ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS
