As well as over 100 prizes for students' achievement and commitment in each subject, a further 21 special awards were given out to those who have shown particular dedication and effort during the Academy's second year.

They included trophies for Citizenship, Independent Working, Group Work, Enterprise and Peer Mentoring. The top honour - CBA's Student of the Year 2010, which was sponsored by Priors Hall Park - went to star student Charlotte Bean, from Year 10. Charlotte was nominated by a number of teachers because of her excellent attitude to Academy life and study. She said: "I was so surprised when I won and I am very grateful to all the teachers who nominated me for the award.

"I am extremely proud and so happy to have my hard work recognised. Winning Student of the Year has given me the determination to work just as tenaciously next year in order to achieve the best GCSE results I can." The awards were sponsored by many local businesses, including RS Components, Roquette, Corby Football Club and Rockingham Speedway, demonstrating the strong links the Business Academy is forging with major local firms and sports organisations.

In addition, the keynote speaker was Claire Young, who was a finalist in Alan Sugar's popular show, The Apprentice, in 2008. She urged students to aim high and work hard to secure their dream job or chosen career.

Principal Andrew Campbell said: "The evening was a fantastic success and we were delighted to recognise the excellent achievements of so many talented and committed young people. They are a credit to the Academy and to Corby. CBA is on a journey to success and anyone who was there on the night can see we are making rapid progress towards our goal."

LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

It is very pleasing to report that during this term more parents than ever before have enjoyed seeing their sons and daughters performing (Music for a Summer's Evening; the CBA Summer Show) and receiving recognition for their hard work and achievements through both the Children's University programme and our own CBA Awards evening.

Students in Years 7 and 8 have represented CBA excellently in the second annual Brooke Weston Partnership inter-academy enterprise event, along with their peers from Brooke Weston Academy and Kettering Science Academy. Key Stage 3 students can look forward to a challenging year of learning in 2010-11 as our plans for curriculum reform are put into action and we continue to raise the bar for future performance in all areas.

I am immensely proud to say that Year 9 students have met our very high expectations with an excellent performance in their end of Key Stage 3 assessments, producing results which are above the national rate of improvement for students with similar scores at the end of primary school.

This excellent result just shows what can be achieved through a strong blend of self-belief and hard work.

Year 10 are already feeling the heat as

they continue to work towards their final examinations next summer. Indeed many have had a first opportunity to sit GCSEs this year and we are working towards well over half the year group attempting to pass their English or maths GCSEs before this Christmas, though there will of course be the opportunity to improve their grades further next summer.

As I have written previously, there is no silver bullet to transform examination performance overnight, but we are making progress on improving standards in all areas. For example, 50% of Year 11 students have already secured a Level 2 qualification in English and maths and well over 50% expected to achieve five or more GCSEs this summer. CBA will always be proud to be a diverse community of students from many cultural backgrounds and with different abilities.

At the time of writing the Year 11 Prom and Sixth Form Leavers' Party are the main topics of conversation in the Academy. I would like to repeat here the sentiments voiced at those events. What we are creating at CBA is a true joint venture between students, parents and Academy staff. CBA is our Academy – it belongs to all of us and will be as good as we make it. There will continue to be difficult tests in the uncertain economic times ahead which will no doubt change all our lives considerably, but the best we can do for our children is prepare them well for the challenges they will face in the world of tomorrow. You can be rest assured that all of us here at CBA are totally committed to that aim.

Finally, you will see that this edition of In Press features an article about Steve Ellis, Vice Principal for Behaviour and Guidance at CBA. Steve is retiring after 35 years working tirelessly for the benefit of Corby children and families. He will still be a familiar face around CBA next year as he will continue to work with the Brooke Weston family of schools in a part-time consultancy role. This town owes him a huge debt of gratitude and I am sure you will join me in wishing him all the best for the future and for his new post.

It has been a second eventful year at CBA, but as it ends I reflect on how proud I am of our students and of the dedicated parents and staff who are keeping the faith with the CBA journey.

SENATE RELOCATES FOR SPECIAL MEETING

An update on a new bus service for the Academy was given to the Senate when it held a special meeting at the neighbouring Priors Hall Park Future Centre.

The Senate relocated to the centre, which is the hub for the new housing development next to the Academy, for its meeting on July 8th.

The main item on the agenda was an update from Nick Small of Northamptonshire County Council's transport department.

He attended the meeting to fill members in on plans to introduce a public bus service to serve the Academy and the surrounding area.

It is something the Senate has been lobbying for so there are better transport links to the Academy during the evening and to make it easier for parents who don't have a car.

Mr Small said they are aiming for buses to run every 30 minutes and are hoping to introduce the new service in January 2011. The Senate also discussed its budget and agreed to invest in some cross-training equipment for the Mind and Body Studio in PNS. A LOOK OVER THE WALL

CBA is forming links with Priors Hall Park which could see students getting involved with projects including wildlife conservation.

Work to create 5,100 homes and the necessary infrastructure is continuing at a rapid pace – and with CBA on the doorstep, there will be opportunities for the Academy students to learn from the huge project.

Daniel Polak, from BeLa Partnership development company, said: "The team at Priors Hall Park is proud to have already been involved in day-to-day life at the Academy, something which will only increase as the relationship gets closer. "Going forward there have been many discussions about how Priors Hall and

CBA can work together, and we look forward to developing these ideas over the coming months."

CHANGES TO THE TIMETABLE

Changes to the Academy's daily timetable will see the introduction of a three-session teaching day in September.

In the afternoon, Years 10 and 11 will have Tutor Time from 1.25pm to 1.45pm and Years 7, 8 and 9 will be in assembly (except on Wednesdays when Session 3 starts at 1.25pm).

Session 3 will run from 1.45pm to 3.30pm.

After-school time will be re-named Session 4, which will conclude at 5.45pm.

HEALTHY SCHOOLS PRESENTATION

CBA WAS PART OF A CELEBRATION EVENT TO RECOGNISE WHAT SCHOOLS IN NORTHAMPTONSHIRE ARE DOING TO ENSURE THE HEALTH AND WELL-BEING OF YOUNG PEOPLE.

ARTS MUSIC & INDUSTRIAL DESIGN (AMID)

design your own THEME PARK

It was a rollercoaster ride for Year 8 students who were challenged to design their own theme park.

As part of a week of design technology, a team visited Wicksteed Park to look at aspects of marketing, food design and the engineering of rides.

On their return to the AMID Faculty, they reported their findings to their teams and set to work creating their own original theme park.

Different students looked at different areas, including music that could be played on the carousel, the artwork for rides, marketing their venue and producing healthy food options.

Other students looked at theme park memorabilia and even created some samples, including mousemats, keyrings and textile designs. The project is something that will be developed at CBA during 2010-11.





FOCUS ON ART: YEAR 8. AFRICAN CULTURE HAS BEEN THE FOCUS FOR YEAR 8 ART STUDENTS THIS TERM.

The group has been looking at African patterns and headwear and their studies culminated in the creation of some African masks, which have been displayed in both the classrooms and the central area of the Faculty. A group of Year 8s has also been involved in the production of an animation sequence during Session Three. They joined forces with some Year 9 students as part of a master class programme for those students talented in art.

The group worked with professional animator Andy Ralston and produced a series of animations on green issues. Director of Art Jacqui Brown said: "Year 8 have worked very hard this year and I am very pleased with the creative work they have produced. I and the staff in the art department look forward to working with them in Year 9."

THE BEAT GOES ON FOR STEEL PANS

The steel pan drums have proved to be as popular as ever with students who have been learning to play them in the last few months.

The drums have been used in Key Stage Three music lessons, with students learning anything from Yellow Bird to songs from The Lion King soundtrack. Music Teacher Felicity Cornish said: "The great thing about the steel pans is that anyone can have a go and they are quite easy to play.

"The whole class can play together and there's a real sense of teamwork and achievement involved."

Year 7 student Alex Rayner commented: "I think it gives you better hand eye co-ordination and also it's really fun."

The Steel Pan Band boasts 15 members, including two members of staff and meets every Tuesday in Session Four.

STUDENTS SEE RECIPE FOR SUCCESS AT CADBURY

Business Studies students got a taste of how a major company operates when they paid a visit to Cadbury World.

Eighty Year 9 students visited the chocolate maker's educational centre near Birmingham as part of their Business at Work programme.

The idea came from the Academy's Young Chamber and it gave the year group a valuable insight into the company's key areas of work, such as human resources and marketing.

They also found out more about the takeover by Kraft and the affect it has had on the firm.

Business Studies student Chelsea Taylor said: "The Cadbury World trip was a great success. Not only did we have fun but we learnt a lot about business and what the industry is like to work in. "A lot of students, including me, now understand more in our business classes."

The group followed up the visit with an Enterprise Day to look at how Cadbury apply the four Ps - Product, Price, Place and Promotion – in the company's marketing strategy.

They worked in groups to develop and present a chocolate product, with the winners coming up with a novel idea for 2012 Olympic Chocolate Rings.



YEAR 10 PUBLIC SERVICES EXPEDITION

Twenty-two Year 10 students travelled down to Brecon in South Wales on an expedition. This is a vital element of their BTEC course and the students had spent a term planning the exercise. The students were split into two teams, Bravo and Charlie, and as part of the two-and-a-half day itinerary, they had to test their camping skills and physical fitness. The students camped out for two nights and had to cater for themselves before undertaking a strenuous mountain trek which took in four peaks of the Brecon Beacons. This was topped by Pen y Fan at 850m, a range which is used by the elite Special Air Service for selection and training. So in fact we did our own CBA version of this tough course known as the Fan Dance.

The students were fantastic and all gave 100% getting through the pain barrier and reaching every top. Each student was determined to finish the trek despite blisters and fatigue. Special mention goes to John Atkinson who had to endure my blistering pace and the mountains twice through the week – well done indeed.

Expeditions such as this are a great opportunity to develop team and personal skills as well as building upon character and the Year 10 group excelled in all of these.

VALUABLE HELP WITH JOB INTERVIEWS

Sixth Formers who will soon be applying for jobs or university places got the benefit of practising their interview skills on a group of professionals.

Members of Corby Rotary Club paid a visit to the Academy to put 'interviewees' through their paces and to give them an insight into the kind of questions they could be asked.

The Rotarians' backgrounds include a successful career in education and years spent in business, either running their own company or their own department.

Sixth Form student Connor Wilson said afterwards: "I learnt a great deal from participating in an interview and I received feedback on areas I needed to improve.

"The advice was particularly useful as it came from members of the Rotary Club who hold a wealth of information generated from experience in industry."

Business Studies Teacher Alex Allan and Humanities Teacher Nigel Holt organised the visit and they said the experience was as close to a real interview as possible, helping to develop students' confidence.

COMMUNICATIONS (COMMS)



GREAT RESULTS FROM READING SCHEME

A weekly reading competition set up to improve literacy has already resulted in huge improvements in students' reading ability. Accelerated Reader pits each Year 8

English class against each other in a battle of the books.

Each class is given time during lesson to read an allocated book – appropriate for their individual ability – and then students complete a quiz either at school or at home about what they have read.

The class with the average amount of points each week gets a prize and gets to display the trophy in their classroom.

The scheme was introduced three months ago and the overall winner was Teacher Simon Smith's class, who were treated to a trip to the cinema. During Term 6 Mr Smith's class read 123 books – a staggering 7,328,616 words in total. Literacy Coordinator Kim Asher said Accelerated Reader has resulted in a huge uptake of library books and in the case of one student, their reading age increased by six months in the space of just four weeks. Miss Asher said: "It's also promoted reading for pleasure."

In September, both Year 7 and 8 will compete in Accelerated Reader while Year 9s will go head-to-head with readers from the Brooke Weston Academy.

Year 8 student Shannon Miller said: "I like Accelerated Reader because it has encouraged me and others to read more books. It's important to read to get a good education and a good job it the future."

CELEBRATION CEREMONY FOR CORBY LITERACY PROJECT

Parents were invited to a special presentation evening to see the work of students who have taken part in a literacy project.

CBA teamed up with the Brooke Weston Academy and The Kingswood School to offer a series of workshops aimed at raising students' attainment in English.

Seven Year 8 students from CBA joined other students once a month to take part in a variety of literacy activities, which included animation projects, comic book designs and drama workshops.

They also went on a two-day residential to the Frontier activity centre in Irthlingborough.

The programme, which started in January, is linked to the Children's University and the students 'graduated' at a ceremony at West Glebe Pavilion in July.

English Teacher Rachel MacAllister said: "The Corby Literacy Project used lots of different learning tools to show English in a fun way.

IMPROVING COMMUNICATION SKILLS

CBA has carried out a survey to help students improve their communication skills and equip them for the future.

The Academy, in conjunction with the National Literacy Trust, carried out a speaking and listening survey, with 420 Key Stage Three students taking part. people view speaking and listening skills, what they believe employers and universities expect in terms of these skills and how confident they feel about communicating.

The results showed that:

- 98% of students communicate most frequently with friends and family by speaking face-to-face. This is followed
- closely by the use of text messages (96%)
- 53% of students would like to be better at speaking in front of the class

CBA will be using the findings to help develop students' speaking and listening skills both in the classroom and to prepare them for the future.

CBA WELCOMES FRENCH STUDENT

French student Margaux Larrue, from one of the Academy's partner schools in France, spent time at CBA this term. The 16-year-old had been struggling to follow her English lessons so she spent three weeks at the Academy to help her improve.

Margaux, who is from Lycee Saint Martain de Paris, joined Year 10 students in their lessons and very quickly made friends.

She was able to help with French lessons and students enjoyed meeting her and finding out about student life in France. Margaux particularly enjoyed English lessons with Teacher Lisa Dawson – she found the lessons interesting and said that French teachers could learn from the good relationships between teachers and students. Director of French Hayley Bennett said: "Margaux could not believe how lucky the students were to have so much technology in and around the Academy. Very few French schools have the use of interactive whiteboards in lessons – many of Margaux' lessons still use a blackboard and chalk.

"Overall, it was a fantastic experience for both Margaux and the Academy. It is hoped that in the future we will receive more students from our partner schools in France and also have the opportunity to send our students to France."

SCIENCE STUDENT JOINS PATHOLOGY DEPARTMENT PROJECT

A student who wants a career in science research was awarded a bursary placement on a research project based in Northampton General Hospital's Pathology Department. Year 12 student Gabby Tarrant applied for the Nuffield Bursary Placement and spent four weeks in July working in the hospital department.

The project focussed on identifying a type of species of bacteria and Gabby had to produce a report on her findings.

It was an invaluable experience for Gabby, who also helps out in the Academy's

science labs during her free time and is studying chemistry, biology and business studies A Level.

She said: "I heard about the bursary from teachers at CBA and I thought it would be an interesting thing to do during the holiday, instead of a normal summer job like working in a shop.

Gabby, who wants to study chemistry or bio-chemistry at university, also opted to nominate the project she worked on for the Big Bang science celebration in London and she's keeping her fingers

crossed it will be selected. She said: "The attraction of science is the need to know more – that's why I want to go into research."



LESSONS IN OUTER SPACE

Students took a trip to another world with a visit to the National Space Centre in Leicester. Year 8 were set two challenges – to write a travel brochure for the planets in the solar system and to describe what life on Mars might be like. They had to use the resources and information at the discovery centre to complete their tasks. From details of the moon landing to

demonstrations of particle physics, the trip gave students a chance to see science in action. Director of Science Elaine Ponton said: "The space centre has a lot more resources than we do – students can do things like touch a meteor or present the weather forecast.

"There were a lot of hands-on experiences for them."

One of the exhibitions was a display of tins of baked beans, each one held down by the different levels of gravity on each planet. No one was able to lift the tin held down by the

No one was able to lift the tin held down by the equivalent of the sun's gravity.

The trip was particularly beneficial as the year group will be studying space when it moves into Year 9 in September.

DANCE 2 EDUCATE SHOW

Talented students showed off their dance skills at a showcase event this term.

Twelve star performers from Year 9 took part in a show after working with a choreographer from professional dance company, Ludas Dance. The sell-out event, which was held at CBA, saw students from nine Corby schools come together to perform each of the pieces they had been working on.

Ludas Dance, one of the country's most respected educational dance companies, also performed their touring piece called ID:me. Dance Teacher Francia Dickinson said: "CBA's performance on the night was very strong."



CBA HOSTS CRICKET COMPETITION

A number of Corby primary schools were invited to the Academy this term to take part in two afternoons of cricket.

Active Teacher Phil Woolley organised the events, which included boys' teams from Rockingham Primary School, Danesholme Junior School, St Patrick's Primary School, Woodnewton Primary School and St Brendan's Primary School. The eventual winner was the Rockingham Primary School team.

Pupils from Corby Old Village Primary School, Danesholme Junior School, St Patrick's Primary School, St Brendan's Primary School and The King John School took part in the girls' competition, with St Brendan's crowned champions.

Those who joined in with the mixed competition were also from Rockingham Primary School, Our Lady of Walsingham Primary School, Woodnewton Primary School and The King John School from Thrapston, who were the winners.



MATHEMATICS & INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (MAIT)

WEBSITE DEVELOPERS LOOKING FOR NEXT CHALLENGE

A group of students which developed a website for Corby Business Group were presented with gifts as a thank you for their efforts.

Corby Business Group approached the Academy for help in designing a website and the challenge was taken on enthusiastically by CBA's web group, which meets in Session Three.

They will even use the website to advertise their services as webdevelopers for other organisations. Ika Casta from Corby Business Group handed over gift vouchers to Steven McBride, Steven Forsyth, Clark User and Haydon Close, who dedicated their spare time to the project. She told them: "We're really impressed with what you have done and we wanted to say a big thank you. "It was a real-life project for you to complete, rather than just pretending and it's something we hope to build on." She told them it had already been tested by one of the companies and was found to be working well. Steven McBride said: "This was something new to us so we have learnt new skills. It will look good on our CVs." Teacher Karl Lomax, who led the project, said the next step is making sure the website appears in the top 10 on Google.







PEER MENTORING SPIRIT AT CBA

Student solidarity has been out in force at CBA, with students helping their peers with lessons and exam revision.

The peer mentoring spirit was demonstrated by three Sixth Formers who asked for exam tips from Year 10 maths whizz-kids Steven Forsyth and Clark Usher. The pair went through past exam papers with Sixth Formers Richard White, Chris Usher and Adele Bagnall, who re-sat their maths GCSE this summer. The group was spotted hard at work after school by Kirsty Farrar, Head of Raising Aspirations.

She said: "They had their exam the next day and it was something they had set up themselves. "It's a great example of students now working together and supporting each other."

In Year 10, maths students were split into groups and given different questions to tackle.

When they had finished solving the quadratic equations, they had to demonstrate to the rest of their class how they reached their answer.

Maths Teacher Maxwell Sam said: "The benefit of teaching each other is that it builds students' confidence and they have to work as a team.

"It also helps them because students explain the problem-solving in way others can understand."

DUKE OF EDINBURGH SCHEME GOING FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

CBA's Duke of Edinburgh scheme is developing well, and the creation of the group has helped Northamptonshire to achieve growing numbers of young people taking part in the award programme.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme, which aims to develop young people and recognise their skills, was set up at the Academy last year and is run by the MAIT Faculty. CBA was one of 7 schools in the county to establish a new group during 2009-10.

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GOODBYE MR ELLIS

The man described as "Mr Corby" is stepping down from teaching after 35 years in the classroom.

Vice Principal Steve Ellis is retiring from CBA after a career helping hundreds of young people in Corby reach their potential. It all started in 1975 when Mr Ellis was taken on as a PE teacher at Beanfield Comprehensive. He remembers his first day as a slightly nervous 21-year-old faced with a room of Year 11 girls. The teacher in charge of the class even refused to grant Mr Ellis the small responsibility of unlocking the type-writer cases. He said: "They scared me to death – it was quite an introduction to teaching."

Mr Ellis became Head of the Middle School and was then appointed Head of the Upper School, a role he took on for 10 years.

and remained at Beanfield Comprehensive until it closed in 2000.

He moved into the newly-formed Corby Community College before being made Vice Principal for Student Care and Guidance at CBA.

Mr Ellis said the highlight of his career has been helping young people through difficult times. He said: "When the steelworks in Corby closed, lots of young people couldn't see a future but the message has always been, the more qualifications you get, the more choices you have. That hasn't changed between 1975 and now.

"There have been lots of students I have been proud of and some of those I have taught have ended up working in the same school as me. "I have mixed emotions about leaving but I would like to think I will still be around to see



the fulfilment of potential at the Academy." Mr Ellis will still continue to work for the Brooke Weston Partnership in a consultancy role but he will be spending more time with his wife Mary, their family and their two puppies. His involvement with sport will continue, with Mr Ellis planning to spend more time at Gretton Cricket Club.

He was then made Assistant Head Teacher

SOME PARTING MESSAGES FOR MR ELLIS:

Principal Andrew Campbell: "Steve has been a superb champion of education in Corby for many years. There are literally hundreds of teachers in the profession today who owe him much and have benefitted from his support, not to mention the thousands of children and families he has helped through his teaching and pastoral work.

"I owe Steve a very particular debt for the key part he played in managing the transition from Corby Community College to Corby Business Academy.

"Steve once told me it was his ambition to be able to walk through Corby one day and know the town had four good secondary schools. This is now a reality, but it would not have happened without him."

Vice Principal Tony Segalini: "I have worked with Steve for ten years now. Our nickname for him was Chuck Norris!! He is a great guy to work with; he was my line manager when I was a Year Head at Corby Community College and now a friend and colleague as a Vice Principal at CBA. I have learnt a lot from him particularly on how to keep parents calm and blind teachers with data. Steve is great at calming situations down and is a fantastic pastoral leader. The students think a lot of him and he is always a calm influence in the Academy. Steve has always put a lot in to education and the establishments that he has worked in. I am looking forward to following in his footsteps in CBA next term but also continuing to work with him on a part time basis and as a friend. Remember - 'Steve does not wear a watch because he decides what time it is '

Vice Principal Lorraine Smith:

"Mr Ellis was always a great champion of young people and I've never known him as anything else.

He was always involved in extra-curricular activities and not just sport. He was great at making students feel comfortable – when we went on a ski trip, he deliberately fell over so they wouldn't feel self-conscious if they did. He was the voice of reason and also a windup merchant."

Vice Principal Janet Duggan:

"Although he was from Kettering, he was almost 'Mr Corby'. He used data to highlight students who were under-achieving, so interventions could be put in place. He had belief in young people that sometimes you had to take an unconventional route for them to succeed. He has also driven up attendance at CBA to 93%."

NIKKI VOTED UNSUNG HERO OF THE YEAR

Special Needs Teacher Nikki Clark has received a huge congratulations from CBA after she scooped the Unsung Hero Award at the Evening Telegraph's Education Awards. Nikki was nominated by the Academy because of her "total devotion" to the students in her care and her efforts to develop their learning and improve their environment.

She joined others who have made outstanding contributions to education in the county for the ceremony at the Holiday Inn in Corby, where it was revealed she was the winner.

Principal Andrew Campbell said: "Nikki has been a fantastic advocate for young people with learning difficulties for many years. She is a true 'unsung heroine' – always modest and unassuming but always passionate about her students and unstinting in her commitment to their education and lives.

"This award is a fitting tribute and testament to the warmth and regard in which Nikki is held by the families she works with and the wider community, inside and outside school, that she helps. "We are proud to say she is a colleague of ours here at CBA." Nikki said she thought a group of dinner ladies who had been nominated might clinch it instead of her.

She said: "I'm very pleased – it's great to be recognised but at the end of the day, I love my job.

"I try to get the best for my students because it's great to see how they develop and how they respond to new things. New experiences help them to understand their world and overcome their fears."

Nikki's many achievements include recently securing funding from the Big Lottery for a kitchen garden, which will allow our students



to grow their own food and look after chickens. Student Jack Warrior was also at the award ceremony after being named a finalist in the Pupil of the Year category.

GRADUATION CEREMONY CELEBRATES SESSION THREE SUCCESS

CBA had the highest number of students graduating from the Children's University at a special ceremony this term.

Students gain credits for the amount of after-school activities they participate in.

To achieve a bronze award, they have to dedicate 30 hours to clubs accredited by the Children's University.

The Academy launched the programme in December and just six months later, 85 students graduated – the highest number in the county.

It is a testament to the number and range of Session Three clubs that students can join to widen their learning.

Fifty students from Years 7, 8 and 9 went to the University of Northampton for the graduation ceremony in front of an audience of parents, staff and officials from the Children's University and Northamptonshire County Council.

Aspirations Manager Kirsty Farrar said: "The number of graduates we had is a reflection of how vibrant our Session Three is. Because so many students wanted to graduate, they had to try new things. It's helped to raise aspirations and self-esteem and given them a goal to aim for."

Those who picked up silver awards after dedicating an impressive 65 hours to Session Three activities were Emily Carroll, Jessica Dick, Marcell Peters, Tom Woodward, Danielle Mackness and Ellie Mae Moore.

Some of the accredited Session Three clubs include Animal Club, Animation Club, Battle of the Books and Allotment Club. Principal Andrew Campbell said: "The fact that so many of our students have graduated is a testament to the thriving community we have at Corby Business Academy and shows how students are broadening their horizons and feeling the benefits of success."

LIFE-LONG LEARNING FOR STAFF

Staff at CBA take furthering their education just as seriously as they do for their students – and several have been sitting exams to prove it. Anne Brothwell, who works in the inclusion unit, achieved a life-long ambition when she graduated at Ely Cathedral in June after achieving a BA (Hons) in Humanities. She has spent the last five years juggling work with study after taking up the course through the Open University.

Mrs Brothwell said: "It was something I'd always wanted to do but never got round to it. It was hard at times but I would encourage anyone who wants to get a degree to go for it." A number of staff joined students sitting GCSEs this summer and had the same nervous wait for the results to be announced.

Among them was Sally Knibbs, who is a cover supervisor in the inclusion unit and a High Level Teaching Assistant. She took GCSE English Language because without it, she cannot get a place on the Graduate Teacher Programme.

Miss Knibbs said: "I was desperate to be a teacher and I had to sit it to progress with my career. It was nerve-wracking sitting the exam and I'd only just finished when they said 'pens down'.

"It does help you to empathise with students." Bob Mulholland, who works in the inclusion unit, decided to sit GCSE Spanish after picking up some of the language when he lived there for a number of years.

He said: "I didn't have to start from scratch but it made me realise how much slang I'd picked up."

Other staff taking various different exams include Helen Boothby, Beata Bykowska, and Ann Ingram.

Ms Young said that any student from any background has the ability to succeed if they push themselves.

She said: "My advice is that you have to be proactive – a magic fairy won't just drop a job or career into your lap. You have to think big. "Offer to work for free to get some work experience and make sure you find out the manager's name. It's the small things that show you have made the extra effort.

"If you want to be a hairdresser, think about setting up your own business, or travelling the world doing catwalk shows.

"There's a whole world out there."

SENATE RECEIVES RECOGNITION FROM PARLIAMENT

The Speaker of the House of Commons has given CBA's Senate a seal of approval.

The Academy entered the Speaker's School Council Award, which was set up by Speaker John Bercow MP to recognise the most inspiring and engaging achievements of school councils across the UK. Following the Academy's Platinum Northamptonshire Schools Council Award last year, Kirsty Farrar, Head of Raising Aspirations, decided to submit a bid for the government award.

The application gave details of the Senate's contributions and improvements to school life, including its charity work, involvement in green issues and other efforts. The Academy received the top Platinum award for its school council last September, after the inspector commented that the Senate was a "shining example" of a school council.



CORBY-WIDE OPERATION WILL FOCUS ON YOUNG DRINKERS

An operation across Corby this summer will see a crackdown on under-age drinking. The police, Corby Borough Council and health professionals will be working together to engage young people found drinking in public places in the town. Operation StaySafe will see young people who are found to be drunk taken home to a parent by officers.

Follow up visits will be made to parents to discuss ensuring

their child's safety. Parents can expect to see patrols across Corby throughout the summer.
