CBA STUDENT SENATE OFFICIALLY RECOGNISED AS THE COUNTY'S BEST

Corby Business Academy has achieved a county first. It has been awarded the Platinum Northamptonshire Schools Council Award.

Just one week after achieving the Gold standard, inspector Glenys Cox decided to decorate the Academy with the top honour.

The award is a spectacular achievement, as no other school in the county has reached the Platinum standard and only a handful of schools have a Gold Award.

The inspector said: "The Platinum award is given to the school's that meet the gold standard and then demonstrate their workings within the community and with external agencies.

"The Academy Senate is a shining example of an excellent school council and I have been impressed with the all that I have seen."

The Senate was formed last Autumn and has already been instrumental in making changes to policy and procedure.

Principal Dr Andrew Campbell said: "This is an excellent achievement and a first for Northamptonshire. It is yet more proof that CBA is totally committed to the needs of all its students and shows just what can be done when staff and students really work together."

Senate member Kevin Karuga-Ogwang said: "The Senate gives students a bigger voice within the Academy and I have really enjoyed

seeing our recommendations become part of Academy policy."

Vice Principal Sarah Ashby, who chairs the Senate said: "Our students drive the agenda, they have become very good at deciding themselves what the priorities are for change and finding ways to persuade staff and other students to support their ideas. I look forward to working with this year's Forums and Senate once the elections have been completed in October."

The Academy will be presented with the official award in January. Students will also have an input into a plaque which will be presented to the Academy by Glenys Cox.

This year the Senate minutes will be available to view on the CBA website under the Student Life section.

CELEBRATING GCSE RESULTS

The Academy has proved it is well on track after its first year, as almost 50 per cent of students gained five GCSE A* to C.

This was a 20% increase on the pass rate of the Academy's predecessor Corby Community College and demonstrates the successful transition made by students.

The results were testament to the hard work and dedication put in by students and staff during the Academy's first academic year.

Principal Dr Andrew Campbell said:

"As a collective the students have put in a very strong performance in the first year and we have laid the foundations for continued success.

"We have had very good results from a number of students, many of whom will stay with us and continue their academic studies in our Sixth Form."

EXTRA LATE BUS

Due to the high demand for students staying to do Session 3 activities there will be provided from the start of Term 2 an additional late bus at 5pm.


Students were given an insight into the retailing world when Sainsbury's Team Leader Vicky Davis paid a visit to a Sixth Form lesson.

INTERNATIONAL LINKS

LINK TRIP TO UGANDA

As you read this article a team of Sixth Formers and BHE Teachers will be preparing to take part in CBA's first ever international link trip to Uganda.

Teachers Kirsty Farrar and Dan Arnold, along with students Jordon Joseph and Ross Hay, will head to the Discovery Centre in the African country on October 28th as part of a project to build links between the Academy and the centre.

The Centre, which is a unique residential facility on over 20 acres of ground close to Lake Victoria in Junja, Uganda, was set up in 1994 years ago as a response to the dire situation in regard to AIDS in the country at that time.

The project is run in partnership with UK registered charity Adventure Projects Trust and YWAM (Youth With A Mission), Uganda.

Before leaving Ross said: "It will just be amazing to see what Africa is like. "This is really an experience of a lifetime and it will be incredible to learn about the different culture."

And Jordon said: "I am sure this is experience that will change our lives."

The team have undertaken various fundraising efforts to get together the £4,000 needed to pay for the visit.

In October the team took part in the Great East Half Marathon in Peterborough. After a heroic

effort all the team crossed the finish line, bringing in hundreds of pounds in sponsorship for their cause.

A race night was also held at Great Oakley Cricket Club.

Miss Farrar said: "This will be a fantastic opportunity for the students. It will be a cultural experience which you just cannot emulate in the classroom and the students will also help us set up the links with the centre.

"This time it is Sixth Form students who are visiting but next year it may be a different year group and we are looking forward to see how the international link develops."

The avid reader said: "I really enjoy reading and always have a book on the go. I think Eyes Down is a great scheme and it is nice to be able to have peace and quiet during tutor time so that we can enjoy a book."

The scheme ties in with Accelerated Reader, an online assessment resource that helps determine a student's level of reading and suggest appropriate reading material.

As part of the scheme students take part in an online quiz after they have finished each book which will monitor their progress and suggest new targets.

In line with this, all of the books within the CBA library have been colour coded so that students can assess a book at the right level.

DIGGING FOR VICTORY

A taste of life during World War Two is being experienced by GCSE History students who have set up their own allotment to recreate the Dig For Victory campaign.

Just like millions of Britons during the 1939-1945 war, the students are growing their own vegetables in a bid to understand what life was like in Britain seventy years ago.

The Dig For Victory campaign was introduced by the government during the war in response to a food shortage. People were expected to turn their lawns and flower beds into allotments in a bid to feed their families and their neighbours.

Kirsty Farrar, who teaches the GCSE History class, said: "The Home Front is a GCSE module this year, so we thought it would be a good idea

for the students to keep their own allotment so that they could get a feel for what life was like during the war years.

"As we established an allotment last year behind the PNS Faculty it seemed like the perfect idea."

A variety of winter vegetables will be planted and the students will take ownership of looking after and nurturing their crop.

Lauren Stratford, who is part of the history group said: "I think its a great idea and I have really enjoyed it so far.

"I think it will make it easier to relate to the subject as we will have a better understanding of what life was like for those who were in Britain during the war."



RAF DAY

The RAF were invited into the Academy to put the BTEC Uniformed Public Services group through its paces.

Flight Lieutenants Mal Gavin and Sergeant Del Penman spent the day with the students, leading outdoor teamwork sessions and giving a talk about the military service.

The Academy is the only secondary school in the county to offer the BTEC Uniformed Public Services course, which has once again proved popular with 23 students enrolled.

The course gives an introduction to the uniformed public services and is perfect for students who are considering a career within the police or fire service or any of the military services.

After the day's events Flight Lieutenant Mal Gavin, who is in charge of RAF outreach services for the East Midlands area said: "We had great interest from the students and at the Q & A session 80 per cent of the students asked careers based questions.

"There are more than sixty jobs within the RAF, from pilot to chef and from doctor to driver."

Tony Segalini, who runs the course said: "It was pleasing to have the RAF in for the day and the students enjoyed the activities.

"Throughout the course we will give the students an introduction to all of the various public services and there will also be the opportunity to go on teamwork and skills based trips to places such as Rutland Water and further afield."



VOTE FOR IT! DEMOCRACY AT CBA

Year 7 students have been sampling what it's like to create their own political parties and run their own general elections in Citizenship. Having agreed that democracy is a far better system of government than a country ruled by a dictator or a monarch, students soon got to work on their political manifestos and candidates' speeches.

Convincing and eye catching posters were designed as well as rosettes and party logos. The manifesto promises ranged from more police on the streets to global governance to bring about ever lasting peace in the world.

Everyone was given a chance to vote for the best candidate using ballot papers and a ballot box, with some students taking on the role of official counters and the Returning Officer who announced the overall winner.

To extend their learning even further, students compared the UK system of First Past the Post with the French system of non proportional representation and were split on opinion as to whose electoral system was fairer – but what it did allow us to do was us to practise the little French we knew!


THIS TERM'S RECOMMENDED READ




SAILING AWARD

Mr Roberts, who has been involved with sports all his life, having played rugby for Kibworth and currently holding the position of chairman of Desborough Cricket Club is looking forward to the demanding role.

He said: "We have excellent facilities here at the Academy and it is certainly one of the premier venues in the Corby and Weldon area.

"We already have had a good amount of interest from clubs and organizations, many of whom have been attracted by the top quality of the amenities.

"What we would like to attract now is a rugby club as we have a

great rugby pitch available and the sports hall would be ideal for a local basketball club.
