PRIME MINISTER OPENS CORBY BUSINESS ACADEMY

Corby Business Academy has been officially opened by Prime Minister Gordon Brown who paid tribute to the innovation and enterprise happening within the Academy.

The PM spent two hours having a tour of the school and speaking to staff and students before leading the opening ceremony.

He only had praise for the students and teachers he spoke to during the visit, which saw the country's media descend on the academy.

Speaking to an invited audience in the lecture theatre, the Prime Minister said: "The building is fantastic and the facilities are amazing. But the most important thing I have noticed while walking around is the morale, determination and commitment of staff and students.

"The Academy will ensure that thousands of children have better chances than they would have had before. It will mean that these children will realise their dreams."

Executive Principal Peter Simpson paid tribute to the people who had worked hard to make the dream of the Academy become a reality.

He said: "I would like to thank everybody who has contributed to making the Academy possible.

"We have had great support from our sponsors The Weston Foundation and Bee Bee Developments, the

borough and county authorities and Corby MP Phil Hope whose moral support throughout has been a great strength."

After the tour the PM held a 30 minute question and answer session with invited guests and among the topics he discussed were the importance of university education for all and the global financial problems.

Head Girl Jacqueline Tsiga, who along with Head Boy Jordon Joseph had the honour of giving the Prime Minister a tour of the faculties, said: "The Prime Minister was genuinely interested to hear about what is happening here at the Academy and said he was really impressed by the students and their obvious ambition."

After the visit CBA Principal Andrew Campbell said: "To have such a high profile person as the Prime Minister to open the Academy is a sign of the excellent progress that we have already made and it was a fitting tribute to the hard work of the staff and students."

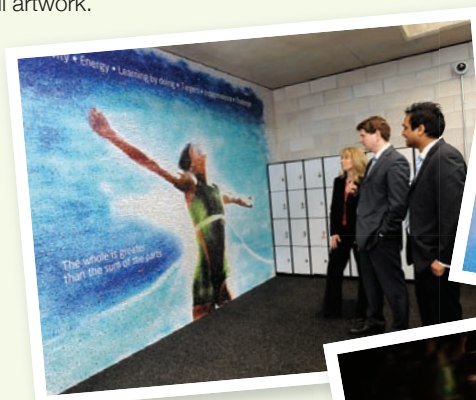

The Year 11 students heard a talk from Bob Norton who was a refugee during the Second World War.

They heard how he had to travel around many different countries to survive being persecuted by the Nazis and how all his family perished in Auschwitz.

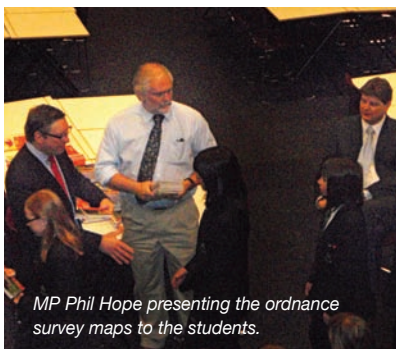
The Year 9 students listened to a talk by Rudi Oppenheimer, who was a survivor from the notorious Belsen camp.

Rudi told the students how he and his siblings managed to survive but his parents died of starvation.

After the talk students got to ask questions which gave them a chance to develop their understanding of this terrible period in history.

As a follow up to this event, students will create assemblies for key stage 3 and 4 to discuss what they have learned and gained from this experience. Students also have access to the www.historyspeaks.org website which has further information on the events of the Holocaust and other recent genocides.

MP Phil Hope presenting the Ordnance Survey maps to the students.

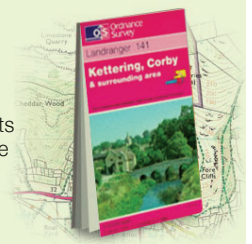
MAPPING THE WAY

A CLOSER LOOK AT BUSINESS FINANCES

BTEC A level students undertook a study of two of the most important financial statements for a business, learning about the profit and loss account system and the balance sheet.

The aim was for students to understand how a business measures trading and performance and establish profit figures and net worth of a business.

In today's economic situation, one of the most important objectives for a business is to make a profit. Students had the opportunity to recognise that the P&L account of a business shows the extent to which a business is successful.

They learned to recognise that the balance sheet is like a photograph taken in an instant in time, giving a picture of what the business owns and what the business owes at that moment in time.

Maths GCSE is now solely based on the exam. Students in Year 11 have now been placed in target groups revising for the summer exams and many are staying for Session 3 to do the mymaths booster packs.

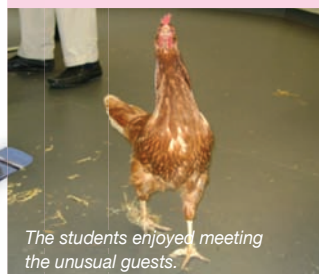
SCIENCE LAB TURNS INTO A FARMYARD

APPEALING TO GREEN FINGERED STUDENTS

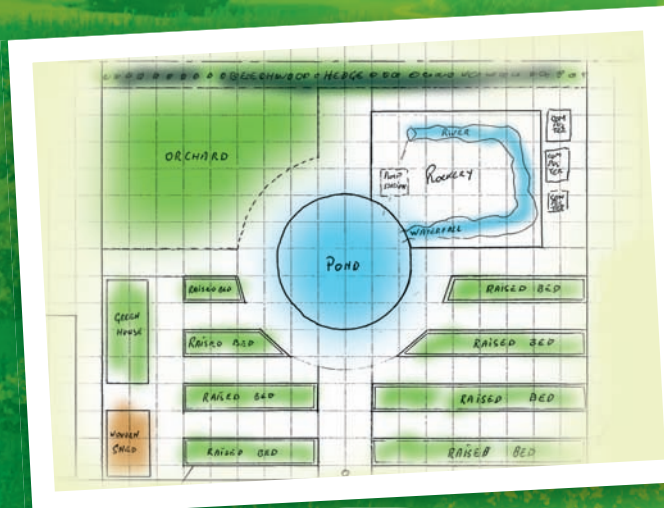

COMMUNICATIONS (COMMS)

YEAR 9 AND THE HEADSPACE PROJECT

On Wednesday, 4th February a group of CBA Year 9 students were invited by Corby Library to watch the play *Racytile* and were also consulted on the planned Headspace area in the new Corby library.

Corby is one of twenty places in four areas of England, which will have a Headspace. The area, for 11-19's will be in the new Corby library, situated in the Civic Hub and should open in 2010. Young people will be able to read, listen, surf the web, play games and chill here.

Headspace will be delivered by Northamptonshire Libraries and Information Service in partnership with young people, and will have full input into the design of the new area. One of the most innovative elements of the project is the idea of young people being served drinks and a book of their choice by a specially trained book waiter.

CBA students were asked for feedback about the design and furniture of the new Headspace. Indeed, central to the development of Corby's new Headspace are the views of local young people. This is a very exciting project for Corby Library and it's great to think that CBA students are a big part of the planning and development.

The play *Racytile* was performed by the Shout drama group which is a group which involves young people from Corby. The theme of the play *Racytile* [anagram of literacy] is about a boy who loves to read, but is bullied by his contemporaries for being uncool. As the play progresses, the attitudes of the children change and they want to read books and join the library.

After the play, the students discussed the implications of the play, for example being bullied and called a 'boff' for enjoying reading. An excellent idea that was proposed was young people could record books for other young people and could listen to them on their ipods to get them engaged with the world of literature.

SIXTH FORM STUDENTS HUNGRY TO DEVELOP THEIR ENTERPRISE SKILLS



Solway Foods, a major employer, has thrown open its doors to the students giving them the chance to work closely with every department within the organisation.

This unique project was launched in Corby Business Academy on 23rd January when students discovered they were to be given the opportunity to work on real problems with real outcomes alongside experienced personnel from Solway. Over the next ten weeks, groups of students will be working on a variety of activities which will culminate in a presentation of their findings.

Solway Foods, part of the Northern Foods Group, which employs more than 500 people in Corby and has an annual turnover in excess of £100m, was extremely keen to link with the Business Academy.

The link will allow the students to draw on the particular expertise of their specialist personnel to widen their skills and understanding of the work place.

The launch began with a teambuilding session lead by Anjana Rajani, Director of Power to Progress. This allowed students to discover their own strengths and weaknesses, which will enable them to allocate job roles and responsibilities within their group. In a 'Meet their Mentor' session they posed questions, discovered how the company operates and found out about the wide range of careers and jobs available, plus the important role each mentor has within the business.

Northamptonshire's Education Business Links Organisation (EBLO) which formulated the project, has been working closely with Solway and Corby Business Academy.

Julie Thompson, Work Related Learning and Enterprise Advisor at EBLO, said: **"This is an exceptional opportunity for the students to see first hand what is involved in running a business of this size. This will enable students to discover the variety of jobs and careers within Solway, plus give the students first hand experiences and generic skills which will help them either enter the world of work, or enhance their UCAS applications or CV's."**

Dr Andrew Campbell, welcomed the opportunity for the Academy to be involved with a major employer in Corby.

He said: **"We are very grateful to be given the opportunity to work with Solway, the enrichment project will enhance the students' knowledge and understanding of the subjects they are studying"**

Students will be mentored over the project as they attempt to create a new self-contained 'Ready Meal'. They will investigate consumer preferences, allergies, calorific values, packaging and design, marketing and sales, selection and recruitment, and the impact on the environment of expansion and transportation.

Laura Sharp, of the human resources department at Solway, said: **"We are very happy to help these students develop their enterprise and employability skills."**

"I would encourage any employers to directly share their experiences with students, it is one of the best ways to inspire young minds and get them interested and involved".

"Using the team/leadership skills learnt and used in my twelve year military experience as an Infantry Officer, we are able to develop players' skills and team awareness thus developing overall performance.

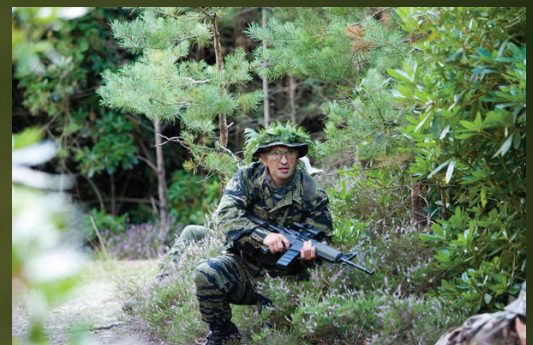
"Our leisure market has been successful, with our games running every other Sunday and attracting up to 100 people a day.

Twilight by Stephanie Meyer

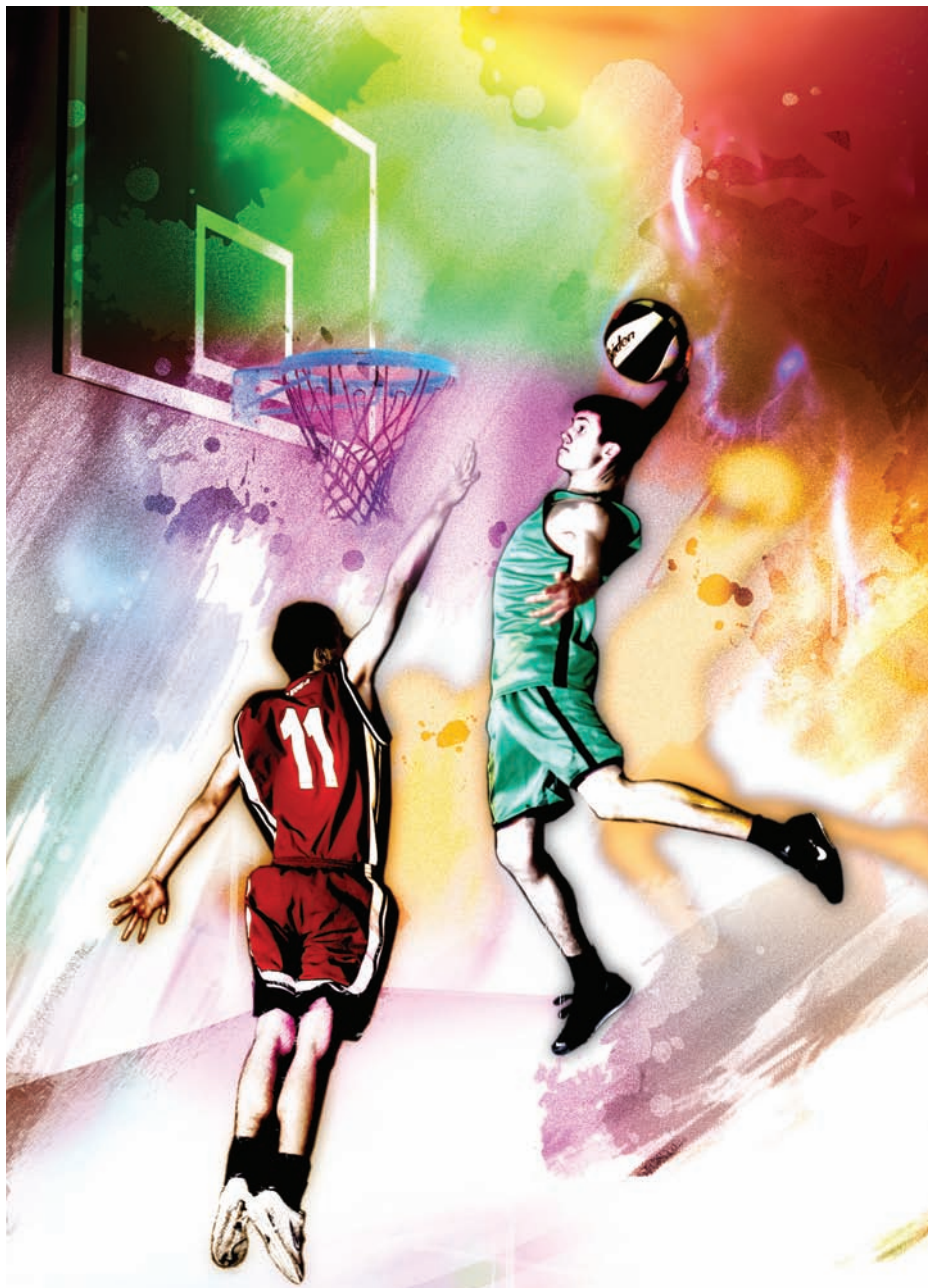
