CBA MUSICIANS ON SONG AS THEY PLAY THEIR WAY TO A DOUBLE TRIUMPH

Our talented student musicians are celebrating after picking up two cups at the prestigious Eisteddfod. The Senior Concert Band retained its title in the Open Category at the event in March and the Brass Ensemble lifted its first award, claiming first in the instrumental ensemble in the 16 years and under category.

CBA Musical Director Clive Wears said: "The performances were fantastic and I am extremely proud of the students."

"There was a lot of hard work and rehearsal leading up to the Eisteddfod, which has paid off."

"The challenge now is to retain the titles next year."

The Senior Concert band, which beat the Southfield School for Girls Brass Ensemble into second place, played ten minutes of music in the competition, treating the audience to music from the film Shrek and also a medley from Les Miserables.

The adjudicator's remarks of the performance said the band 'was a very well organised large ensemble with a fine sense of organisation'. Particular mention was also made about the 'lovely percussion playing'.

And the Brass Ensemble was applauded by the

adjudicator for its 'spirited and lively performances'.

Second in the category was the Bishop Stopford Flute Choir and third place went to the Latimer School Recorder Duet.

And the music group's triumphs were not the only success at the event. Talented Year 11 drama student Kalya Wilson collected first for her Memorised Prose Speaking in the 14 years and over category.

LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parent/Carer,

Earlier this term CBA was visited by Her Majesty's Inspectors to carry out a monitoring visit before we have our first full OfSTED next year. I am very pleased to report that they recognised we have established all the fundamentals for raising standards including improvements in behaviour and attendance since the school moved from the town centre.

Some of the key points from the visit were:

- Behaviour is much improved and attendance is good.
- The quality of teaching is good.
- Safeguarding, care and guidance for students is good.
- The curriculum is well adapted to meet the needs of all our students.
- Leadership and Management is highly effective in embedding ambition and the capacity for further improvement is good.
- Overall progress is satisfactory based on 2008-9 Year 11 performance.

Even as we face the challenges of raising attainment, which will remain tough here for several years to come, we are going from strength to strength. Indeed inspectors recognised the progress we are making to drive up academic standards by the end of Year 11 in our second year. They said: "The current position is showing improvement... students are currently making good progress in the majority of their lessons."

So, as we enter this critical time of year for so many students in different year groups I think we can be justly proud of our progress so far, but ready to redouble our efforts for the final few weeks before examinations start in earnest.

The Lead Inspector told me: "What is highly unusual about CBA is the strong sense of shared purpose to really bring about transformation." I think this is right. Students, staff and parents are working together to improve CBA and with that powerful partnership, we will continue to move forward over the next few years.

Main judgement: The Academy has made satisfactory progress towards raising standards. This judgement cannot be any higher until CBA can demonstrate improvement in terms of the Year 11 English and Maths measure.

Areas for improvement

- Emphasise role of assessment during lessons
- Development of literacy skills in all subject areas
- Eliminate any weak teaching
- Consider more direct contact for governors with the Academy in the working day.

SENATE LEADS THE WAY

THE CBA Senate's achievement of being the first student council in Northamptonshire to reach Platinum status was officially recognised in March.

Students Nicole Parsons (Year 10) and Connor Wilson (Year 12) went along to the ceremony held at the Northampton Saint's ground Franklin's Gardens in Northampton.

The Senate is now only one of two schools in the country to hold the honour, and was asked to give a presentation at the event, outlining how the Senate works and why it is successful.

The award for Platinum status was given by Northamptonshire County Council Cabinet Member with responsibility for Children and Young People Andrew Grant, who made reference to his experience of seeing the Senate

working at first hand when he spent a day at CBA last year as part of the national Councillor Back To School Day.

He said: "I was really impressed by the ideas that flowed in the Senate meeting and some of them I even took back to my workplace."

The Senate representatives were accompanied by Corby Mayor Mary Butcher and travelled to the event in the Mayor's official car.

Cllr Butcher said: "It is fantastic to see where the Senate has come from at its beginnings just two years ago. Their work is an inspiration to all other secondary schools."

Nicole Parsons also received a certificate

for her nomination in the Outstanding Council Member category.

BHE STUDENT SURVEY RESULTS

A small sample of classes within each year group were asked to complete a questionnaire about their experiences in BHE.

Overall, we were very pleased with the outcomes.

Over 80 per cent of the respondents felt that they are treated fairly by adults in the Faculty and feel safe. Teachers are respected, have high expectations of their students, and help them to improve their work. However, the perceived lack of variety in some of the lessons was highlighted as an area we could improve.

We have begun to address this by using more filming and model making, and have planned for visiting speakers to share their experiences with students. We also have some off-site activities planned.



Daniel Forscutt attends Tresham College on Fridays where he is doing a Towards Independence ASDAN course.


As part of the course Daniel and the rest of the group painted a modern art canvas.

INSPIRATIONAL TALK FROM LEADING FEMALE POLICEWOMAN

One of Northamptonshire's top police officers gave an inspirational talk about her rise to the top.

Superintendent Tina Wetherall-Pegley, spoke to a group of female students from Years 10 to 13 and used her own life story to show them how success can be achieved.

The officer, who leads a team of 79 people and has been in the police force for more than 20 years said: "I want to show that anyone can achieve something if they work hard enough. If you develop a work ethic you will be successful in whatever you choose to do."

The officer, who has recently been involved in breaking the largest organised crime ring the county has ever known, has worked her way up from Police Constable to Superintendent by focusing on what she wanted to achieve.

During her career she has worked as a fire arms officer, been a member of special branch, and more recently worked undercover to investigate corrupt officers within the force.

The working mother told the students to make the most of the opportunities that will come their way in the future.

She said: "I don't do this job because of the salary or status, but because I see it as a vocation and I want to serve the community. "I see success as helping to make communities safer."

The officer, whose role is Head of Public Protection, has also been involved in creating domestic abuse centre The Sunflower Centre and in setting up the Rose Project – a project devised to tackle the issue of prolific offenders.

Dajana Vucenovic who was in the audience, said: "The talk was really inspirational and has made me think about my future and what career I want to follow."

ACADEMY TRAVEL PLAN MOVING FORWARD

A Travel plan for the Academy is being put together.

Staff, students, parents and governors have been involved in the consultation carried out to make sure the routes to school are safe.

As part of the plan, the car parks (both staff and parent), the traffic calming measures, cycle routes and transport have been considered.
